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not the time to discuss the revenue bill, if the hon. member for Carleton wished to move the amendments he had mentioned, he would have an opportunity of so doing when in committee on ways and means. He was willing, however, to adopt the suggestions of the hon. Secretary, and pass over this chapter until it was determined what course to adopt in reference to the revenue bill.

FRIDAY, Feb. 24

The House after the transaction of routine business, proceeded to the order of the day at 11 o'clock, in further consideration of the Report of the Law Commission. Hon. Attorney General introduced his amendment to the codified Report Bill, substituting the words exported by whatever means, for shipment, in the old Act. The intention was to prevent Hacmatat Knees or other lumber from being floated in rafts to a foreign port.

Hon. PROVINCIAL SECRETARY opposed all interference with the Export Law of 1843, which had worked admirably. He was willing to do anything the House pleased about Hacmatat Knees, but thought it was dangerous to alter a single word in the Export law, which had already been so well tested.

The amendment was carried—yeas 16; nays 11. The chapter was then passed without further amendment, and the Report occupied the House until 4 o'clock.

Mr. Cutler put several questions to the members of the Government, which will be answered by the Attorney General to-morrow morning. Several petitions were presented, and leave obtained by Mr. Gray to bring in a bill to amend the Act relating to the European and North A. Railway Company.

Hon. Mr. Gray presented a petition praying for legislative aid to enable the Grand Falls Railway to complete their undertaking.

SATURDAY, Feb. 25.

This forenoon, two bills, one to establish the Albert Manufacturing Company, and another to establish the Albert Asphaltum Gas Company, were committed and agreed to.

Mr. Cutler's question of yesterday to members of the Government were answered by the Attorney General; they related to the reasons why certain sums due on public Account had not been collected.

Attorney General's answer was in effect that under all the circumstances the Government were not willing to put the parties to the expense of defending the suit unless the House should desire it. This could be done at any moment by moving an address to the Governor on the subject. In a telegraphic despatch it would be impossible to give a fair statement of the questions and answers without far exceeding the limits prescribed. Correspondents and regular reports will fully explain the circumstances.

This being the last day for receiving petitions, the House continued to sit without much business before them, until after 3 o'clock, when they adjourned.

FEB. 27th, 1854.

Early this morning, the Road Committee, consisting of a member from each County, was called to the Committee Room by the Chairman, which left the House with thin benches. Several Bills, none of which possessed much importance beyond the locality to which they are intended to apply, were committed, viz. a bill relating to the boomage of streams in the County of York, and a bill to incorporate the Fredericton Rural Cemetery, passed. A bill to commute statute labour in the Parish of Portland was committed, and progress reported until all the members from St. John should be present.

The House afterwards proceeded to the order of the day in further consideration of the report of the Law Commission. Progress was made thereon. About eleven chapters were passed without any amendment or much debate. The Road Committee is still sitting. House adjourned at 3 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, March 24.

Early in the morning, the debate on the report of the Law Commission codifying the Act relating to Municipal Corporations was resumed. Mr. Boyd expressed his belief that a large majority of the inhabitants of the County of Charlotte were in favour of that County being incorporated. Mr. Johnson made a powerful speech in reply to the Attorney General. After a long debate, in which a large number of the members took part, the Attorney General replied at length, and the report of the Law Commission was proceeded with. A number of chapters, up to 44, were agreed to, and progress reported.

The Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Hatheway after leaving the Chair, took the opportunity of making some observations on the proceedings of the day, complaining of Mr. Williston having accused him of partiality while in the Chair. He also regretted ever having voted a single shilling of public money for the support of the Law Commission, as he saw no end to the discussions to which their report gave rise!

Mr. Connell, Mr. Williston and others, replied. The report was accepted, and leave given to sit again.

A discussion afterwards arose on the reception of a school petition, introduced by the hon. Attorney General. The petition was not received.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.—The total value in sterling of goods imported into St. John, and the

outbays attached to it, including Miramichi and the North Shore, during 1853, was £1,656,907.—In 1852 the value was £1,063,554. This shows an increase in 1853 over the previous year of £594,353.

The value of exports from St. John, and outbays, in 1853 was £984,000 stg. In 1852 it was £714,860, showing an increase of £269,340 stg. We shall probably publish the account in detail next week.—*Courier*.

EMIGRANTS.—The number of emigrants who arrived at this port in 1853, was 3337, at Miramichi 21, and at Shediac 46; making a total of 3404 for this port and outbays. The number arrived at St. John in 1852 was 2035.—*Ibid*.

The Temperance Telegraph says, that a man named John Johnston, in the Parish of Woodville, K. C., came to his death by suffocation in his cellar, while putting out fire which was caused by a candle coming in contact with straw round potatoes. His aged wife went to bring some snow, and on returning found him prostrate and cold. His age was 72 years.

VICE ADMIRAL SIR GEORGE F. SEYMOUR, K. C. B.—On Sunday last, Vice Admiral Sir George F. Seymour arrived at Halifax, by the Mail Steamer *Merlin* from Bermuda, accompanied by Lieut. Fortescue, and other officers of the Flag ship *Cumberland*. Sir George and Suite will leave Halifax for England in the Mail Steamer this evening; and it is rumoured that, on arrival there, he will be placed in command of the powerful fleet now fitting out for the Baltic. It is quite certain that wherever Sir George F. Seymour is employed, the honor and glory of old England will be well sustained.—*New Bruns*.

TEMPERANCE.—During the past week a Temperance Convention, previously advertised, assembled at the Temperance Hall in this City, [Halifax,] and was attended by a large and respectable body of Delegates from various parts of the Province. The chief subject of their deliberations has been a Prohibitory Law, something like that so well known as the "Maine Law," which it is desired to pass through the Legislature in order to restrain the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks, except for sacramental, medicinal and mechanical purposes, and under certain regulations. The discussion of this important subject has been characterised by much ability, prudence and moderation; but as the action of the Convention is merely of a recommendatory nature, and designed to put the Legislature in possession of the opinions of the people of Nova Scotia, with regard to the proposed enactment, we add nothing more at present as to the details of the measure. On Thursday last the Speaker and Members of the House of Assembly, and several Members of the Legislative Council, attended in the Temperance Hall by invitation from the Delegates, when an able address, replete with valuable statistics, and varied information, bearing on the subject in hand, was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Cramp, and was listened to by the Honorable Gentlemen with marked attention.—*Church Times*.
