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with destruction of the Russians; but this is not confirmed.

A part of the allied fleet had returned to Constantinople to escort Turkish supplies to Varna.

A portion of the Turkish fleet had gone to Egypt to ship 12,000 well trained troops including a regiment of heavy artillery (much wanted) and a regiment of riflemen.

The Russian regiments of the guard are ordered to the Baltic Provinces, by March 1st.

The Russian Vice-Commander of Sebastopol was cashiered, for not preventing the English frigate Retribution from entering that port.

Bell, the English Engineer, is released.

FRANCE.—A council was held at the Tuilleries, on the 30th. The question of sending an expeditionary land force to Turkey was fully discussed. It is proposed to send 80,000 men in four bodies, under command of Generals Canrobert, M'Mahon, Belisier and Bosquet. England will send only a small force, but will pay half the expense.

The mission of Prince Napoleon to Belgium was for the purpose of impressing on the King the necessity of acting firmly with the allies against Russia, as Belgium cannot maintain neutrality without incurring the displeasure of France. The Prince will go on a similar mission to Prussia and Germany.

To Jan. 29th, neither Austria, Bavaria nor Saxony had made any communication to the German Diet respecting neutrality.

GUIZOT AND THIERS.—Guizot (who is married to the Russian Princess Lieven,) declares that the Czar will not abate one iota of his pretensions as regards Turkey, and Thiers, who affects peculiar sources of information, states the same.

PRUSSIA.—The Prussian Government has not yet spoken out, but the Crown Prince is reported to have declared strongly in the Council of State the necessity of siding with the Western Powers.

SWEDEN.—The temper of the people is increasingly hostile to Russia. The Chambers granted, with enthusiasm, all extra supplies required to put the country in a state of defence.

AUSTRIA.—Orloff's interview with the Emperor was brief. It is not known how he sped. The people appear more in favour of the Western Alliance. The concentration of the Austrian troops goes on in Romagna.

SPAIN.—Great discontent exists. Revolutionary handbills are everywhere circulating. The popular feeling at present is in favor of the King of Portugal, or anybody but a Queen.

SWITZERLAND.—Some political inquietudes are working in the Canton of Zurich; military precautions are taken.

ITALY.—French influence is much increasing in Naples. Great uneasiness exists throughout Northern Italy, and an outbreak is far from improbable.

PERSIA.—The latest accounts state that English influence still preponderates.

GLASGOW, 31st Jan., 1854.

The arrivals in the Clyde, from British North America, during the month, have been by 16 vessels, registering 10,394 tons, comprising four from Quebec, 11 from St. John N. B. and 1 from Dalhousie, N. B. For corresponding period last year, the tonnage employed was 1,997.

### Arrival of the Baltic.

All Negotiations ended!—War inevitable!—England and France preparing in earnest!—Bread-stuffs still declining in price!

The news received by the *Baltic*, (by telegraph to the News Room,) is of the most exciting nature. The final rejection of all negotiatory propositions renders immediate war the only possible mode of settling the Russo-Turkish difficulty; and accordingly England and France are now actively engaged in the most formidable preparations for the inevitable conflict. It is to be hoped that a just Providence will vouchsafe signal success to their arms, and enable them summarily and effectually to chastise the arrogant injustice of the rapacious Autocrat of Russia. The following intelligence was received Monday last at the News-room:—

The steamship *Baltic* arrived at New York on Sunday night, with dates to 8th inst.

The *Europa* arrived at Liverpool on the 6th.

The Czar's last proposal has been rejected, and negotiations have broken off. The Russian Ministers have left London and Paris.

Instructions have been sent to the English and

French Ministers to withdraw from St. Petersburg. France and England are making open preparations for war.

Count Orloff's mission to Prussia and Austria has proved a total failure; he returns direct to St. Petersburg.

It is positively stated that the Cunard Steam ships are ordered into service, to convey troops to Constantinople. Ten thousand British troops were rapidly being collected to form the first division.

RUSSIA.—An Imperial ukase orders all reserves and soldiers on furlough immediately to join the Russian army.

In France, preparations for war go on unceasingly, night and day.

The Czar's rejection of the note of the Four Powers has been officially received in Paris.

MARKETS.—FLOUR.—The improved feeling exhibited on the departure of the last mail has not been sustained, and a further reduction of 1s. on Flour has been experienced. Flour and Wheat have declined 3s. per barrel, and 1s. per 70 lbs. from the highest point. Indian Corn has receded from 2s. to 3s. A limited business doing. Cotton was active, with an upward tendency.

### SECOND DESPATCH, VIA QUEBEC.

It is said that the Serbian Government, yielding to the suggestion of the Russian Consul at Belgrave, will refuse to accept the two firmans of the Sultan unless Russia gives her consent.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 29th.—It is said that the Emperor, who is fully aware of the position in which he is placed, will endeavour to avoid a general conflagration, if he only preserves his honour and rights. The influence of Count Nesselrode is again in the ascendant. It is said that the Czar is about to write an autograph letter to Queen Victoria, in which he will endeavor to prove that he has not been the aggressor.

War is considered positive in England. Several of the Cunard Steamers are taken up by the Government to carry troops to Constantinople; 6000 men to go from England; others will take up different stations in the Mediterranean. About 10,000 men will soon be collected to form part of the first expedition. There is no doubt a brigade of Guards will form part of the expedition.

The combined fleets were at Beikos Bay on the 27th Jan.

LATEST AT LIVERPOOL.—The Paris *Patrie* confirms the statement that Omar Pasha's movements have cut off all communication between the Russian armies.

The Russian fleet is understood to be concentrated at Kafir.

The news from the Danube states that Omar Pasha has effected a most important movement, having crossed the Danube with 50,000 men, and divided the Russian army, the right wing of which is at Krajova, the left at Galatz, and the centre at Bucharest. Omar crossed in person at Olinitz, and at the last accounts was only two days' distance from Bucharest, where the Russian force is weak. The supposed object of Omar's movement was to attack the rear of the Russian army, on its march from Krajova against Kalafat.

A significant indication of England's probable policy has just been made, and is recorded in the *Times* of to-day.

Sir Charles Napier, the gallant old admiral, had a long interview with Lord Aberdeen last Wednesday.

Sir Stephen Lakeman, who commanded the Waterloo Rangers in the late Caffre war, has obtained permission to serve as the commander of a Turkish army in Asia Minor.

## Domestic.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 18.—In the morning most of the members were out on Committee.

Provincial Secretary moved order of the day. House went into supply.—Mr. Hatheway in the Chair. A number of grants for ordinary service passed, when Committee rose and soon after the House adjourned.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 20.

House occupied nearly the whole day in discussing the first Bills in the report of the Law Commission, proceeded and agreed to all in the printed volume down to page 17, with only one alteration, viz:—striking out section 2nd in chapter 2nd relating to enclosures of the Public Lands in which the Province Hall now stands.

Mr. Gilbert brought in a Bill to establish polling places in the parish of Waterboro' in the County of Queen's, read a first time.

Mr. Boyd moved for returns from the principal Post Office, for the month of January last, address carried and a committee appointed to wait on His Excellency.

Mr. Earle brought in a Bill relating to the qualifications of freeholders in a certain case—read a first time. House adjourned at 4 o'clock.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 21.

This morning the Provincial Secretary, by command of His Excellency, the Lieut. Governor, laid before the House a despatch having reference to the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway. It would appear that the holders of the stock (class A) offered to relinquish to the Company their stock, which relinquishment was accepted by the Board of Directors, and an application is to be made to the Legislature for an increase of the Capital of the Company.

The day was principally occupied in Committee

of the whole on the Report of the Law Commission, and progress reported, without any material alteration in the original draft as printed.

Later in the afternoon a Bill to incorporate the Dorchester Agricultural Society, was committed and passed.

Capt. Robinson presented the Petition of James Boyd, Esq., praying to be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the scrutiny between himself and Mr. Fitzgerald—petition received.

House adjourned at half-past 4 o'clock.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 22.

The House was occupied principally in receiving petitions. Some debate occurred—particularly with respect to the reception of School petitions.

A Bill to increase the capital stock of the Bank of New Brunswick was committed and passed. A Bill to incorporate the St. John Seamen's Friends' Society was also committed and passed.

His Honor the Speaker laid before the House the returns from King's College.

Mr. McLeod presented the petition of Isaac McLean, of Waterbury, Q. C., complaining of the Government with reference to the management of the Crown Land Office. The Surveyor General defended the Government. Petition referred to a Select Committee.

House adjourned at a quarter past 4.

FATAL CAUSALITY.—On Monday last, while three lads were amusing themselves coasting down hill on a hand-sled at Kingston, King's County, an ox which was by the roadside became frightened, and in leaping over the sled, one of his feet struck John Walker, the hindmost boy, on the side of the head, causing his death in about an hour. The deceased was about twelve years of age, son of Mr. Henry Walker.—*Courier*.

THE NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.—The Hon. Provincial Secretary last evening laid upon the table of the House the following Resolutions, which will be debated to-day:—

*Resolved*, That in the opinion of this House, it is expedient forthwith to commence the construction of the Railways contemplated by the Act passed during the last Session, entitled, "An Act to authorize the construction of certain Railways in this Province."

*Resolved*, That in order to provide Funds for the construction of the said Railways, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to open the Savings' Bank, and to issue Province Paper in such manner and to such extent, as may appear prudent and necessary,—to open Cash Accounts with any of the Provincial Banks or with any Banking House in London, and to issue Provincial Bonds or Debentures.

*Resolved*, That the assignment, construction, and management of such Railways shall be confided to a Commission, to consist of six persons, to be appointed by the Governor in Council, the person first named in the Commission to be the Chairman, and to have a casting vote.

*Resolved*, That the portion of the work to be first commenced shall be that which, extending in a northerly direction from the Harbor of Halifax, will form a common Trunk for all the Lines.

*Resolved*, That the said Commissioners shall draw upon the Receiver General for any monies required; and account to the Financial Secretary quarterly, but shall not be empowered to extend monies or incur liabilities to a greater extent in any one year, than Two hundred thousand pounds.

*Resolved*, That should any difficulty arise, demanding such interference, the operations of the Commissioners may be restrained by an Order in Council, until the Legislature can be consulted.—*Halifax Chronicle*, 14th.
