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lands granted in County of St. John, including part of King's County, opposed. Warm debate followed. Sustained by a division of 22 to 7.—Mining Bill returned amended from Council. Rejected on ground that Council have no right to amend money bill.

House in supply. Several grants passed for wharves, St. John river. Grant of £100 for Mechanics' Institute, Albert Co. Also, £100 for similar purpose, Dalhousie. Also, £300 to aid Steam navigation between Shediac and Prince Edward Island. Grant of £700 to make Herring Cove a harbour of Refuge; rejected. Grant of £100 to Mechanics' Institute. Loch Lomond, rejected. Grant of £225 to Wharf, Fredericton, passed.

April 5.—House all day in supply. Grants passed—Madras Schools, £400; Catholic Schools, St. John, £300; ditto, Portland, £30; Emigrant Building, St. John, £300; Legislative Library, £300. Distressed Indians, £250, Wharf opposite Fredericton, £100; S. D. Miller, Teacher, St. John, £50—Gray proposed £100—smaller sum named and carried; William Segee, stage last year, £50; and some small grants.

Grants rejected—Rev. James Hudson, return duties on stained glass, £13; Temperance Hall, St. George, £100; Enoch Gordon, Westmorland, an old land grant, £32.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—On Thursday last, in kind compliance with the request of the Directors of the Mechanics' Institute, the Hon. Judge Wilnot re-delivered his lecture on *Russia*, which he had recently delivered at Fredericton. As there, so here, the audience was as large as the bounds of the Hall would permit; indeed in some parts the pressure was so great that some uneasiness must have been felt. Great patience, however, was exercised, and for nearly two hours and a half the dense multitude continued to listen to the popular orator, with scarcely a change of position, except what arose from the excitement of the risible muscles, when any anecdote was related having a tendency to create a smile, or the ruff, which followed a severe denunciation of Russian Ambition, or a sarcastic exposure of Russian trickery. The lecture was, in the main, historical, accompanied with valuable geographical and statistical statements. Looking at Territory, the empire is indeed immense, but, regarding the position of the people, it is weak. They are a nation of slaves. The Hon. lecturer described their condition in a manner that was calculated to arouse the sympathy of those who are yearning for the amelioration of the human race. We heartily accord with His Honor in hoping that, if it be the will of heaven, the conflict into which the conduct of the haughty Czar—the Imperial Slave master—is precipitating the nations of Europe, may teach him a salutary lesson, and be the means of opening the eyes of his millions of serfs to the happier condition in which they might be under a less despotic sway. Perhaps one of the most interesting parts of this most excellent lecture was that which related to the manner in which the Russian nation passed from heathenism to a profession of a form of Christianity, under Vladimir, and the manner in which this Emperor was led to adopt the creed of the Greek Church. The late Emperor Alexander had commenced some beneficial reforms, but the present Autocrat has buried them in oblivion, and restored all the corruptions.—*Cour.*

NEW TOW-BOAT.—A new tow-boat called the Sultan, made her appearance in our harbour on Saturday last. She is propelled by a screw instead of paddle-wheels, and is peculiarly suitable for towing, for which business she is altogether intended. Her register measurement is only ten tons, but including her engine room, she measures fifty tons. She is a very powerful boat, and was built at Philadelphia about a year and a half ago, but has lately been employed in towing in the Boston harbor. She is owned by John Walker, Esq., of this City, who has displayed much enterprise of late in the manner in which he has provided steam accommodation for the public, and who intends to keep her along with the steamer Conqueror solely for the towing trade of the port. The last named boat has had new boilers this winter, and is now in thorough repair, so that the largest vessel may now be towed up the harbor in the strongest freshest with these two boats, one on each side of her. We hope Mr. Walker will be remunerated for his enterprise.—*Id.*

We perceive that the Laws passed this Session, and already assented to by the Lieut. Governor, are now in course of publication in the Royal Gazette. Among others are several relating to the internal affairs of this City, one of which provides, *inter alia*, that the Corporation shall have authority to *affix the names of the various streets*, wherever required, and *to number the houses*; and imposes a penalty of £5 on any person removing or defacing any such name or number. This is a very useful and necessary enactment.—*Obs.*

These two evenings past, the sky being clear, one of those erratic visitors, called Comets, and in days of superstition deemed fiery harbingers of divine wrath, has been visible in the north west of our horizon. It has a well-defined nucleus.—*Id.*

The Packet Ship *Liberia*, from Liverpool, which came into port yesterday morning, brought 59 passengers.

SHIPWRECK AND LOSS OF LIFE.—The steamship *Canada* on her passage to Boston, ran down the brig *Belle*, of Halifax, on Wednesday night last, and she sunk in three minutes afterwards.—Two persons on board of the brig were lost, viz, Mrs. Keefler, widow of the late Charles Keefler, of Halifax, and the steward, named Thomson, who is supposed to have been crushed to death while asleep in his berth. Capt. Meagher, of the *Belle*, had a narrow escape, having been knocked down and stunned by a blow from a block, and when consciousness returned the water was six inches above the deck of the sinking vessel.—*N. Br.*
