

THE BANK OF WESTMORLAND, NEW BRUNSWICK.—Whilst the Royal Assent is unaccountably delayed or refused to the Bank Act of this Island, our more energetic neighbour, have passed an act during the late session, incorporating the above institution; and not only commenced operations there, but established an agency here under the management of Mr. Purdy. We have glanced over the Act of incorporation, and perceive that the affairs of the bank are subjected every six months to the strict surveillance of the Government. Besides the stock of the bank—which will always be ample security for the public—each stockholder is privately liable to the extent of his stock for claims on the bank. The notes are redeemed in gold and silver not only at the place of issue, but at the Bank of New Brunswick, in St. John. Under these circumstances, it is almost needless to say that its notes, although new and strange to the people of this Island, are perfectly good.

Perhaps we have written more in favour of a local bank, in the path now actually followed, than any other Journal; but at the same time, so far from entertaining jealousy of the rivalry of any other bank, the public should be glad of its establishment, because it will certainly benefit from the competition.—*Charlottetown Islander.*
