

DOMESTIC.

THE CIRCUIT COURT.—Having finished the criminal business, the Court has been engaged for the last few days in trying civil causes. Yesterday, we learn, no business was done; it being found impossible to collect a jury; a striking and practical comment on the absurdity and inconvenience of the change in the periods for holding the Circuit Courts in St. John. We hope ere long to see the repeal of this unpopular enactment.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—Next Monday evening the Lecture season of this Institution will commence. The Rev. Mr. Forrester, of Halifax, will deliver the opening lecture, whose subject, we understand, will be "The Use and Progress of the various branches of Natural Science."

His Excellency, Sir Edmund Head, the new Governor General, arrived with his family and suite at Quebec, on the morning of the 7th inst., in the Steamer *John Munn*, from Montreal. They were received on the wharf by Colonel Thorndyke, R. A., Commandant of the Garrison, Lieut. Col. Irvine, A. D. C., Captain Hamilton, Military Secretary, &c. No public demonstration took place, as the day of His Excellency's arrival was not previously notified, but although the Steamer arrived unusually early in the morning, a large number of persons were assembled on the wharf to witness the debarkation.

The Legislature of Nova Scotia is summoned to meet for the dispatch of business on the 2d of December. It is expected that the Reciprocity Treaty is the main object of the call at this early period. Other subjects, however, may also come before them.

The mail for England, via Halifax, was dispatched on Monday by Steamer as far as the Bend, in order to expedite its arrival at Halifax, travelling being very tedious and difficult by the ordinary land route; many of the Bridges having been swept away by the late heavy freshet.

FATAL CASUALTY.—On Monday night last, Capt. Allen Henry, of the Brig, *Palermo*, of Windsor, lost his life by falling into the new slip from the roadway near the steps at Reed's Point, a short distance from the large gas lamp. He was on his way towards his vessel, which was lying at a wharf in Lower Cove. He leaves a wife and child at Kentville, N. S.

We trust the Corporation will now see the necessity of having the roadway and a portion of the landings at Reed's Point guarded by a sufficient railing.—*lb.*

It is computed that the number of blacks held in slavery in different countries is seven and a half millions, of which 3,095,000 are in the United States, 3,240,000 in Brazil, 900,000 in the Spanish colonies, 140,000 in the republics of Central American, and 80,000 in European establishments in Africa.

A VENTURESOME GREW.—A large mackerel boat of about 20 tons is now undergoing the necessary repairs and alterations at Newlyn, for the purpose of conveying a crew of five men to Australia. To enable the boat to sustain the many storms which may be expected on her voyage out, and to render her as secure as possible, the crew have coppered the lower part of her hull; in addition to which, she is comfortably decked, cabins also being placed for the accommodation of the tars who intend to navigate her. The boat will be ballasted with fresh water.—*Cornwall (Eng.) Gazette.*

ANOTHER ARCTIC EXPEDITION.—Dr. Rae, of the Hudson's Bay Arctic Expedition, had an audience with Sir James Graham on Tuesday, at the Admiralty, on the subject of his discovery of the probable fate of Sir John Franklin and his companions. The interview occupied a considerable time; in the course of which Sir James Graham announced the intention of the Government to send out, early in the ensuing spring, an expedition, in order to make further search for the remains spoken of by the Esquimaux; and the command of the expedition was offered to Dr. Rae.
