

# LOSS OF THE STEAMER "CITY OF PHILADELPHIA."

The *City of Philadelphia*, 8 days and a few hours from Liverpool, was lost near Cape Race on Sept. 7th. Passengers all saved. She was running ten knots at 11 p.m. It was very dark and rainy. She struck on Cape Race, backed off, and ran aground in Chance Cove, 7½ miles north of Cape Race. There she lies in three fathoms of water. There was a hole in the ship's bottom, about 8 feet from the stern, and the water rushing in through this extinguished the fires before she ran aground.

114 passengers landed at Halifax on Wednesday morning, the rest are at St. John's awaiting conveyance.—*Telegraph to News Room.*
