PUBLIC MEETING.

At a Public Meeting, held in the Court House of the City of St. John, on Wednesday, 30th of August, 1854, to take into consideration the propriety of introducing a system of Sewerage and Water Supply for the City and Suburbs.

The meeting having been opened by the Sheriff,—

On motion of the Hon. Charles Simonds, seconded by the Hon. Judge Parker—Charles Johnston, Esq., High Sheriff, was called to the Chair, and Mr. John Boyd was appointed Secretary to the meeting, whereupon—

It was moved by the Hon. Charles Simonds, and seconded by F. A. Wiggins, Esq., and unanimously carried—

Resolved, As the opinion of this meeting, that it is absolutely necessary for the health and comfort of the inhabitants of the city and suburbs, that a sufficient supply of water be immediately provided, and that measures be adopted for the construction of proper sewers, with as little delay as the circumstances of the city and suburbs will admit.

Moved by William Wright, Esq., and seconded by the Hon. John Robertson,—

Resolved, That the management of Sewerage and Water Supply, for this City and Portland, be vested in commissioners; the number, qualification, and mode of appointment of whom shall hereafter be determined upon.

Moved by Hon. Judge Parker, and seconded by Henry G. Simonds, Esq.,—

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to organize a plan, and prepare a Bill and Petition, to be submitted to the Legislature, at its next Session, the same having been first submitted to and approved of, by a meeting to be held hereafter, due notice be given for that purpose, in the public newspapers.

Moved by Beverley Robinson, Esq., and seconded by Dr. Botsford,—

Resolved, That the Committee are hereby authorized to confer with the City Corporation, General Sessions, and Water Company, and request their co-operation in these measures.

Moved by William Jack, Esq., and seconded by Dr. Botsford,—

Resolved, That R. Jardine, F. A. Wiggins, W. Wright, B. Robinson, Rev. W. Scovil, W. Jack, R. F. Hazen, J. M. Robinson, John Owens, R. Reed, H. G. Simonds, John M. Walker, Dr. Wm. Bayard, and Dr. Botsford be the said committee.

Moved by William Jack, Esq., and seconded by William Wright, Esq.,—

Resolved, That Charles Johnston, Esq., do leave the chair and Judge Parker take the same; whereupon,

It was moved, that the thanks of this meeting be given to Charles Johnston, Esq., for his conduct in the chair, and to Mr. Boyd for his services as Secretary, and the meeting adjourned.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

St. John, August 31, 1854.

The Board have this week the pleasure of being able to report a decided improvement in the health of the City and Portland. The cases of Cholera are now so few that the Board of Health do not, after to-day, think it necessary to continue their reports. In a very few days, it is to be hoped, that an all-wise and merciful Providence will be pleased to remove the disease entirely from among us.

It is a great source of congratulation to find the general business improvement so manifest in the City and Portland. Numbers of persons who had left have returned, and resumed their various occupations. Strangers need have no alarm about visiting the City. So far as it has come to the knowledge of the Board not a fatal case of sickness has occurred at any of our Hotels or Boarding Houses.

The Board of Health must again urge on all persons the imperative necessity for exercising every precaution by fumigating, ventilation, and general cleanliness in their dwellings, and removing or burying of all offensive matter in or about their premises. The Board having published the best and most approved material for fumigation, and having caused the same to be used effectually in Portland and the City—as well as having ordered its distribution gratuitously—trust that owners and occupiers of houses, particularly in

those districts where the disease has been most fatal, will do all in their power to carry out the wishes of the Board in this particular.

At a Meeting of the BOARD OF HEALTH for the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland, holden at the Common Council Committee Rooms, 4th September, 1854, the following Order was made:—

WHEREAS, the Mill Pond has been for years past, and continues to be a deposit for nuisances of all kinds, and is now surrounded with an accumulation of putrid and noxious filth, which will in all probability continue to increase so long as the said Mill Pond is open; and whereas it has become evident to the Board of Health, that the Cholera has prevailed of late to a serious and alarming degree in the neighbourhood of the Mill Pond:

Resolved, As the opinion of the Board of Health, that the preservation of the lives of the inhabitants of the City and Portland, demands that the Mill Pond be declared a nuisance and dangerous to health; and farther, if this Board have not the power to fill up the same, and abate the nuisance, that a Law should be passed giving the Board this power; and that a Committee of the Board be authorised to obtain a legal opinion upon the subject, and if it shall appear from that opinion that the power is not in the Board, under the present Law, to have the nuisance abated, that they shall cause a Bill to be prepared for the purpose to be laid before the Legislature at its next Session.
