### NEWFOUNDLAND.

Husted and Kroehl, submarine engineers, of this city, to remove the "Merlin Rock," lying in the centre of the entrance to the harbour of St. John's, N. F., which is the only obstacle to the entrance of the Collins and other large steamers into that port. There Depository, kept by Mr. J. F. Masters, of this city. is now 18 feet of water upon the rock at low tide; but as the Collins steamers draw 23 feet of water when loaded, the Telegraph Company have contracted to reduce the " Merlin Rock" to 20 feet below mean low water.
