The correspondent of the Morning Heraid, writing under date of the 20th of January gives a description of the condition of the British army surpassing in horrors anything that has yet reached this country.

The mortality amongst the British troops is on an average about a regiment a week.

The 46th Regiment, which lately landed in the Crimea 1,000 strong, is now reduced to 117.

Another regiment is reduced to six mon, and of these, when or lered out, two only of the six were found able to walk.

Another regiment utterl; extinct and exterinated.

Great numbers of mea are duly carried rozen out of the trenches, and expire in a few bours.

The clothes are found frozen to the flesh of these poor fellows, and when the stockings are pulled off, morsels of the flesh actually come away with them.

Snow in some places six feet deep.

The thermometer one night stood at 20 degs. below zero. a degree of cold seldom known even in the rightr of a North American Winter.

For 48 hours including this terrible night not a speck of fire nor particle of fuel in the British camp.

Several officers frozen to death.

Great numbers of man frozen to- death, some of whom were only discovered on the access of one of those thaws that rapidly succeeds the sharpest frosts, their boots being seen sticking out of the snow as it melted about the frozen corpses, and this in the immediate neighborhool of their tents, where it was supposed they had sunk overpowered by fatigue.

Oa the 8th of January some of the Guards of her Majesty's Household Brigade were walking about in the snow without soles to their shoes.

The cavalry horses have suffered severely. At the present rate of mortality, the whole division, which musters about 500 horses, will be extinct in 30 days.

The rumor pervaded the camp that the English would be compelled to abandon their lines in front and return to Bulaklava.

A most malignant fever had broken out at Balaklava, from the malaria produced by putrifying corpses of men and cattle, while scurvy, cholera and mortification from frost wounds were sweeping the army in front.

"We have now before Sebastopol enough of troops for our great purpose, unless the hardships and casualties which they are destined still to undergo be infinitely more increased than we have a right to expect. Our Crimean land forces in good serving condition amount to no less than 80,000 men; and this is more than the united armies had counted upon. The increase of service and fatigue has, therefore, nothing in it to cause disquietude.

The latest report as to the strength of the Russian army in the Crimea, sembraced in

the following extract from a letter dated Constantinople, Jan. 29. to the Courrier de Lyon. "The Russian army in the Crimea has just received large reinforcements. It now

consists of :-- the garrison of Sebastopol, supposed to be 30,000 strong; of the army of observation, which occupies very strong positions to the north and cast of the camp of the allies, and which communicates with Sebastopol, though with difficulty ; of detach-

ed divisions in the environs of Batchi Serai and Simpherphol, which may be coacentrated in a few hours, so as to oppose to the besiegers a mass of 100,000 men; of a corps of from 25,000 to 30,000 men fortified in the positions of the Alma, in order to close the road to Sebastopol against Omar Pacha, and to cut off, all communications by land, with the allied army; and, lastly, of about 50,000 memwho are encamped at the entrance of the isthmus to protect Perckop, observe Eupatoria, keep up the communications of Prince Menschikoff with Russia, and he ready to go

whenever they may be required. The Paris correspondent of the London Times gives it as the opinion of military men there that no assault on Sebastopol can take place before Spring. The cannonade could be opened against the town with 450 guns, but will be answered by nearly 800 Russian guns of large calibre. He adds that he should not be surprised if the plan were adopted of giving battle to the enemy, and in the event of beating him, returning to take up position on the Balbeck, so as to complete the investment of Sebastopol on the north as we do now on the south side. Thus hemmed in on all points, it is the opinion of military men that the city would be utterly unable to hold out for any length of time.
