UNITED STATES.

Kansas .- Violence and commotion are still the order of the day in this ill-fated Territory. Since our last, we have to report an attack on the Quaker Mission by a company of Southerners. This Mission is, or rather was, situated on the road between Lawrence and Westport. These peaceable people were attacked on the 22d ult., by an armed band of Georgians, who plundered them of their horses and other property, and committed all sorts of wanton outrage against their persons, completely breaking up their settlement and compelling them to flee for their lives. It is said that Mendenhall, the President of the Company has returned to Indiana, the place whence he emigrated. Col. Titus' camp of Borderers was recently attacked near Lecompton, by the Free State men, for the purpose of rescuing eight emigrants from Illinois, seized while passing quietly along the highway, and threatened with death at the hands of Titus. The result of the attack was the capture of Titus and his party, twenty in all, who were taken as prisoners of war to Lawrence. In the engagement Titus was wounded, and Capt. Shombre, a free State man, was killed. This occurred on the 16th, and on the 17th Gov. Shannon visited Lawrence to arrange for an exchange of prisoners, and after a long conference with the ree State men, it was finally agreed that he would deliver up the five prisoners arrested a few days before at Frank'in by Marshal Fuin, under under writs for having attacked the ruffian fort there; he would use the U.S. forces to repel any armed body found in the Territory for other than peaccful purposes; and he would deliver up the cannon taken from Lawrence at the time the hotel was destroyed. On their part the Lawrence men were to release Capt. Titus and his nipeteen men held as prisoners. This arrangement was carried out promptly, so far as the prisoners and guns were concerned; but the Governor did not keep his promise to use the dragoons to drive out the

Intelligence had been received at St. Louis, on Saturday, stating that the Missourians are of Westport, on the dividing line of Missouri and Kansas. Companies were arriving daily from the different counties. Gen. Atchion was said to be in command of the Missourians, with Col. Doniphan as second, and Capt. Reid as Adjutant.

Intelligence from Kansas was received at Chicago on Saturday: Three thousand Missourians are collected at Westport and Kansas City, and it is expected they will march on the 30th, in different detachments, along both sides of the Kansas River, to surround the Free State settlements all the way west as far as Topeka. General Richardson had marched north, ostens bly to intercept and capture Gen. Lane, but actually to prevent assistance coming to Lawrence through Nebraska. No communication could be had with the river, except at the risk of life,

LATER.—A dispatch dated St. Louis, Sept. 1st.

says: We have advices from Kansas to the 27th ult. The acting Governor (Shannon) was at Le-compton, and on the 26th issued a Proclamation, declaring the Territory in a State of insurrection, and calling on all law-abiding citizens to aid and assist the legal authorities to preserve the peace and protect the persons and property of citizens. Gen. Lane is understood to have three parties stationed at different points in Iowa, for the purpose of receiving supplies, or making his escape in case he is compelled to flee.

The Army Appropriation Bill has at length passed both houses of Congress, "without the proviso declaring that the President shall not employ the United States troops in enforcing the territorial laws." This has been one of the memorable struggles of our government, and to the enemies of free institutions it may furnish occasion of renewed assault, as if it were impossible for a government distributed as ours is among co-ordinate branches to long hold out.
"We have seen what the result must be," they may say, " that the Senate and Ifouse are liable at any time to become antagonistic, that the President and Supreme Court may engage in similar conflicts, and that in the absence of an over-shadowing king and court as the balance wheel to regulate minor improvements and to subdue refractory officials, the whole fabric must in the end fall to pieces,"

Those who reason thus fail to consider that we have a far more conservative power than king and court—the rood sense of the people—which holds their rulers in check, and promises in the end to preserve in its integrity the authority which these conflicts between the President, the Senate, and the House, tend to dissolve and destroy. We must not loo' to Washington but to the masses spread out between the northern lakes and rivers and the Mexican Gulf, between the Atlantic and Pacific, for the real powers of government. We have more faith in the justice of the many than of the few, in commonalties than in courts, and we would admonish those who are looking for our haltings, to estimate duly the powers and prerogatives of the people. The ballot box is more potent than presidential presenting and the safety of our government derogative, and the safety of our government de-pends far more upon the intelligent verdict of pends far more upon the intelligent verdict of the people than upon noisy demagogues or official incumbents. Let the people be educated to moderation, temperance, and justice, and all will be safe.
