Dreadful Steamboat Explosion—Five Lives Lost—Many more seriously injured. We have to record another of those dread

Pierce, one of those small stern wheel steamers, lately employed on the upper St. John burst her boiler some 30 miles above Fredericton on Thursday, causing a dreadful loss of life. The following despatch was received at the News Room yesterday:—

FREDERICTON, May 9. Yesterday about noon, the steamer J. D. Pierce burst her boiler, while on her way to Woodstock. The steamer Richmond which was passing down at the time, immediately rounded to, and rescued the passengers and part of the freight. It is not yet exactly ascertained how many lives are lost; certainly not less than five, among whom were Mrs. T. M.
