they were; they will be neither annexed to, nor embodied in, the treaty, but an article of the treaty will allude to those acts and to the new concessions of the Sultan, in terms which will result [practically, we suppose, not formally] in an engagement of the Sultan not to disavow his acts, and in a guarantee to the Christians by all the contracting powers."

Turkey, in fact, is, for the most part, to be let alone. If her own energies are incompetent to sustain her, no amount of propping up from without will effect the purpose. The great danger which threatened her is now over, and it is for her to show herself before the world honourable, strong, and wise, or inevitably to succumb. The latter alternative does not seem to have been contemplated by the Congress. It is justly assumed that there are elements of strength in Ottoman Empire quite sufficient for every purpose of national greatness, provided only they have fair play."

FRANCE.—The health of the Empress continues excellent. On Thursday her Majesty was able to sit on a sofa at one of the windows of the palace, to witness the departure and return of the splendid cortege which accompanied the Emperor to and from the review.

The *Moniteur* publishes a list of 655 new addresses of congratulation, sent to the Emperor from different towns, communes, and constituted bodies in all parts of the country. The clergy in France have been remarkably backward in their felicitations. This is said to arise from the late compulsory removal by the government of the Bishop of Lucon, an act which has produced the greatest excitement among the clergy, as it virtually brings them under the law as public functionaries, an assimilation which they are determined vigorously to contest.

A grand review came off on Thursday, in the Champs de Mars. The troops reviewed by the Emperor, in whose company were the plenipotentiaries of Europe, amounted to sixty or seventy thousand men. They formed four divisions, independent of the Imperial Guard. The greater part of the guard itself, as well as the entire of the division of General Forey, had been in the Crimea, and every soldier wore the medal of Queen Victoria on his breast. The military school of St. Cyr formed in battalion apart, so that the future officers of the French army were thus present at what was emphatically called the review of peace. There were fifty squadrons of cavalry under the command of General Korte. The review, which commenced before two o'clock, was not of long duration, and the Emperor returned to the Tuileries by four. The only "Order" worn by the Emperor was the British Order of the Garter.

The *Assemblée* states that Count Orloff will remain in Paris in the quality of ambassador extraordinary, and will notify to the Court of the Tuileries the accession of the Emperor Alexander II., whose coronation will take place in the month of August. According to the same journal, France will be represented at Moscow on the occasion by an ambassador extraordinary, and England by the Duke of Cambridge.

It is also stated the Aali Pasha intends shortly to entertain the Emperor of the French at a magnificent fete.

A letter from Toulon states that all the Russian prisoners who were remaining in that port, within the last week, were embarked for Odessa. They were about 100 in number, of whom three were officers. Two vessels at Marseilles are loading for the Black Sea, and one for the Baltic.

THE ITALIAN QUESTION.—The Paris correspondent of the *Times* asserts that the Congress is still occupied with the Italian question, though it is not well known what can be done beyond giving advice to the Pope and the King of Naples.

AN EXCUSE.—The Russian diplomatists in Paris have excused themselves from attending the ball given by the Turkish plenipotentiary on the plea that one of their attaches has the measles.

ANOTHER CONCORDAT.—A concordat between Russia and Rome is spoken of as very shortly to appear.

THE PRINCIPALITIES.—The Vienna correspondent of the *Times* writes:—"The Moldavia-Wallachian question is not definitively settled by the Treaty of Peace signed on the 30th of March, but the parties that have made peace have agreed to send a commission into the two Principalities. On its arrival the commission will proceed to form two general Divans; the one for Wallachia, and the other for Moldavia, whose members are to be elected by the people. As soon as the Divans are duly formed they will proceed to draw up new organic statutes, and propose such reforms as may appear requisite and desirable. When the project of national Divans is completed it will be sent to Constantinople, and, after being revised by the representatives of the powers, the new constitution will be granted to the Principalities by their Suzerain, the Sultan."

PRUSSIA.—The *Staats Anzeiger* contains an official notice, dated the 3rd inst., repealing the prohibition of the export of horses from Prussia.

AUSTRIA.—The Emperor has pardoned 82 political offenders who, in 1849 and 1850, were sentenced by the military courts to terms of imprisonment varying between 10 and 20 years.

The official *Wiener Zeitung* announces that the grand cross of the Order of St. Stephen has been given to Count Buol-Schauenstein, "for his long, faithful, and distinguished services, and his co-operation in the conferences, which led to the peace concluded on the 30th of March."

ITALY.—The *Opinions* of Turin, of the 2nd, in commenting upon the peace, says:—"All the power of Europe will prove insufficient to prevent the political revival of Italy in due season. It is but a question of time and of hard trial, to be undergone in order to attain that end. The time depends on the will of God, the wisdom and perseverance of the nation; the hard trials both for Italy and Europe it belongs to diplomatists to avoid."

The Duchies of Parma, Modena, and Tuscany are in a state of alarming ferment. The Duke of Modena, who was at Venice, has returned in all haste to his capital.

Advices from St. Petersburg state that the prohibition of the export of Russian produce from Russia is repealed.

FREDERICTON, April 25.

After preliminary business, House resolved itself into committee of the whole in consideration of Mr. Stendman's Bill to amend the Prohibitory Law.—Mr. Hatheway in the chair of the committee. Bill warmly opposed by anti-prohibitionists, and supported by those members who voted for the Prohibitory Law, with the exception of Messrs. Hayward and Wilmot. Motion to postpone the Bill for three months, was carried by a vote of 19 to 16.

House in Supply. Usual grant to Lunatic Asylum was sustained, also to Penitentiary, together with an amount for additional buildings. Grants to several proposed superior Schools were rejected.

A motion to grant a sum of money to the Adjutant General of the Militia Forces, gave rise to a long discussion, which occupied the greater part of the afternoon. Motion finally carried by the casting vote of the Chairman.

The Bill relating to the Grand Falls Railway passed after an animated discussion. Mr. Gray announced his intention of dividing the House on the third reading.

Mr. Kerr moved for leave to bring in a Bill to amend an Act entitled "An Act establishing a Board of Health in the City of St. John." Leave granted, and bill read a first time.

House adjourned at half-past six.

FREDERICTON, April 26.

A large amount of business disposed of in the House to-day.

An Act to amend the Act regulating the St. John Chamber of Commerce passed in Committee.

Mr. Gray's Bill relative to Physicians and Surgeons was postponed for three months.

The Bill introduced by Mr. Allen for better securing the liberty of the subject passed without opposition.

House in Supply during a considerable portion of the day. The sum of £1500 was granted for the improvement of the navigation of the St. John River.

Mr. Street's Law-Bill was sustained in the third reading.

In the afternoon the House was principally occupied with the discussion of a resolution introduced by Mr. Fisher, requiring the House to fix the salary of the Auditor General. Several members supported and others opposed. Mr. End moved an amendment that the office be made political, and the incumbent have a seat in the House. The amendment was rejected—the yeas being Gray, Wilmot, Kerr, McPhelin, End, J. A. Harding, McNaughton and Stevens. The original resolution was sustained, and on motion of Mr. McPherson, the salary was fixed at £500 per annum.

Mr. Fisher introduced a Bill relating to the Militia.

About one hundred grants are yet on the Supply Book to be disposed of.

House adjourned at a quarter before 6.

FREDERICTON, April 28.

After preliminaries this morning, a Resolution that the Postmaster General be a Political Officer and have a seat in the House, was proposed by Mr. McPhelin.

An Amendment thereto was moved by Mr. Kerr, that the office of Postmaster General be filled up by the Government with as little delay as possible.

Several speeches were made, and both Resolution and Amendment were rejected by large majorities.

House in Supply.—The grants relative to the Post Office department were rejected by large majorities, in order to be referred to the Government.

A motion to pay Mr. L. R. Harding for the time he was deprived of his seat as a Representative for Carleton County was rejected by a large majority.

Large numbers of Grants disposed of, and it is expected that Supply will be got through with to-morrow evening.

At half-past 5 o'clock, the Standing Order was moved for, and the House sat for a short time with closed doors.

We are informed that the present session of the Legislature terminates on Thursday next.

MARINE DISASTER.—

We deeply regret to have to record that the Ship *Eudocia*, 1015 tons, Spurr, Commander, which left Liverpool on the 6th of March last, is reported as having foundered in lat. 42. N. and lon. 36. W. The Passengers and Crew are saved, having been taken into New York by the *Empire State*. The freight of the *Eudocia* is estimated at about £60,000. The value of the vessel is fully covered by Insurance.

Her enterprising and liberal owners, Messrs. J. & R. Reed, are secure of the sympathy of all their fellow citizens, while general regret will be felt on account of all who may endure inconvenience, in consequence of the loss of the long looked for vessel.

The *Eudocia* was decidedly a favorite with her owners and the public, and the disaster which has befallen her is the first that has overtaken any Ship of the *Black Ball Line*, during the space of three and a half years—in which over 100 passages between the Ports of Saint John and Liverpool, have been accomplished by the vessels of this Line without a single misadventure.—*Morn. Tel.*
