Turkey in fact is, for the most part, to be let alone. If her own energies are incompctent to sustain her, no amount of propping up from without will effect the purpose. The great danger which threatened her is now over, and it is for her to show herself before the world honourable, strong, and wise, or inevitably to succumb. The latter alternative does not seem to have been contemplated by the Congress. It is justly assumed that there are elements of strength in Ottoman Empire quite sufficient for every purpose of national greatness, provided only they have fair play. FRANCE.-The health of the Empress continues exceilent. On Thursday her Majesty was able to sit on a sofa at one of the windows of the palace, to witness the departure and return of the splendid cortege which accompanied the Emperor to and fron, the review.

The Moniteur publishes a list of 655 new addresses of congratulation, sent to the Emperor from different towns, communes, and constituted bodies in all parts of the country. The clergy in France have been remarkably backward in their telicitations. This is said to arise from the late compulsory removal by the government of the Bishop of Lucon, an act which has produced the greatest excitement among the clergy, as it virtually brings them under the law as public functionaries, an assimilation which they are determined vigorously to contest.

A grand review came off on Thursday, in the Champs de Mars. The troops reviewed by the Emperor, in whose company were the plenipotentiaries of Europe, amounted to sixty or seventy thousand men. They formed four divisions, independent of the Imperial Guard. The greater part of the guard itself, as well as the entire of the division of General Forey, had been in the Crimea, and every soldier wore the medal of Queen Victoria on his breast. The military school of St. Cyr formed in battalion apart, so that the future officers of the French army were thus present at what was emphatically called the review of peace. There were fifty squadrons of cavalry under the command of General Korte. The review, which commenced before two o'clock, was not of long duration, and the Emperor returned to the Tuileries by four. The only "Order" worn by the Emperor was the British Order of the Garter.

The Assemblee states that Count Orloff will remain in Paris in the quality of ambassador extraordinary, and will notify to the Court of the Tuileries the accession of the Emperor Alexander II., whose coronation will take place in the month of August, According to the same journal, France will be represented

NEW BRUNSWICK.

From our Fredericton Correspondent.

As carly as the year 1800, and during the adnistration of the Lieutenant Governor Carlton, the College of New Brunswick was establablished, and incorporated. It then had power to con-fer degrees in the liberal Arts and Sciences, and about this time a grant of nearly five thousand acres of land was made by the Province, to that Institution. Some twenty years later, another grant of a public square in the town of Frederic-ton, was made, which was very valuable, and properly belonged to the town. In March 1823, the first Charter was surrendered, and another granted in its place. It continued under this Act until 1829. It then became an endowed In-stitution, under the title of King's College, receiving eleven hundred pounds currency, to be paid from the Treasury of the Province.

The sum was granted upon condition that the King would further grant annually, as an endow-ment for the said College, the sum of one thousand pounds sterling, out of the Casual Revenue of the Province, but it was provided that nothing contained in the Act should be construed to authorize the appropriation of any part of the Pub-lic Revenue of the Province, without the consent of the Legislature. About this time Sir Heward Douglas gave to the College a donation of one hundred pounds, the interest of which was to be applied for the purpose of purchasing the Douglas medal. That money went into the Treasury of the Province, for which the Province pays ten pounds per annum. Grammer Schools were es-tablished about this time, and there is little doubt but some of these schools have done as much to

disseminate education, as the College. The lands granted to the College yield annually a revenue of about four hundred pounds; this added to the endowment of £1,000 stg., and £1,100 currency, will make some£2,700 annually expended on that Institution for the last twenty seven years, which will amount to some seventythree thousand pounds; add to this the value of ter securing the libe the lands, the cost of the buildings, and interest without opposition. on the money for some twenty-seven years, and we would have a sum exceeding one hundred

thousand pounds! At this time the College was very exclusive

in its character. The law provided that all the Professors should be members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and should, previously to their admission into the College, severally sign and subscribe the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, as contained in the Book of Common Prayer. In 1845, an attempt was made to render the Institution less exclusive, and more generally useful to all. According to this Act, no roligious test was required from any of the Pro-fessors, except the Professor of Theology, and he was to be at all times a clergyman of the Church. of England. And any person taking a degree of Divinity here, desired to declare that they believed in the authenticity and divine inspiration of the Old and New Testament, and the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. THE TRINCIPALITIES .- The Vienna correspondent of the Times writes :- " The Moldavo-Wallachian question is not definitive ly settled by the Treaty of Peace signed on the 30th of March, but the ' parties that have made peace' have agreed to send a commission into the two Principalities. On its arrival the commission will proceed to form two general Divans; the one for Wallachia, and the other for Moldavia, whose members are to be elecied by the people. As soon as the Divans are duly formed they will proceed to draw up new organic statutes, and propose such reforms as may appear requisite and desirable. When the project of national Divans is completed it will be sent to Con-stantinople, and, after being revised by the representatives of the powers, the new constitution will be granted to the Principalities by their Suzerain, the Sultan.

PRUSSIA .- The Staats Anzeiger contain an official notice, dated the 3rd inst., repealing the prohibition of the export of horses from Prussia.

AUSTRIA .- The Emperor has pardoned 62 political offenders who, in 1849 and 1850, were sentenced by the military courts to terms of imprisonment varying between 10 and 20 years.
