Death has summoned me hither, the death of our sweet little Nastassy, the little girl you saw with u when you were here. We left her with her Aunt, Mrs. Deborah Collins, who had taken her home with her last summer, the picture of health, and now all that was mortal lies in her coffin in the adjoining room. I immediately started for Liverpool, hoping to arrive in time to see her breathe her last. But I was disappointed. It took me two days to reach the place, and she had died the morning before I arrived. Tc-day we are to put her down in her Saviour's arms by the side of her little brother. There they will rest till the trumpet calls them up to meet the Lord in the air. Bless God for the faith of the gospel ! Who would rob us of the hopes of immortality in such an hour as this ? My little girls' form-she was nearly three years old-never appeared more lovely than at this moment. I cannot forbear going again and again to look at her. We succeeded in obtaining a tolerably correct likeness of her as she appears now. You will pity, I am sure, and pray for her mother. She knows that she is dead. She knows that we bury her to-day. But she could not come on to see her.
