He has the majestic dignity of an Osmanli, the easy and refined manners of a gentleman, and treats those in whom he confides with frank cordiality. He speaks both English and French. As long as Turkey has such men as Aali Pacha she will live in spite of the whole of Europe if ranged against her. Consider only it is he who has arranged the concessions to the rayahs, and you need not dread a false reform."

Resolved, That Municipal Incorporations are necessary for the just and efficient operation of thesystem of self-government adopted in this Province, and for securing and promoting the most essential interests of the people :

Resolved, That it is incumbent on the House, without delay, to pass an act applicable to, and immediately operative throughout the whole Province, by which there shall be conferred on the people in each county, by means of Municipal Incorporations, the power, the privileges, and the duty of governing the affairs of their own Counties and Townships, and electing the requisite Municipal Officers.
