The festivities at Montreal on the occasion of the opening of so much of the road as has already been completed, were of a most imposing character. Eyre, commander of the forces, with a vast array. of Bishops and dignitaries, lay and clerical, to grace the occasion.

The first speech was made by His Excellency the Governor, the next by the Mayer ; these were followed up 'by many others, and the scene was imposing and magnificent. The only drawback was the insult offered the Governor on account of words spoken by him a year or two since, which the French dered derogatory to their race, who now hurl at him chicken bones, and do various unlovely things of the kind, which he appears to have taken very coolly, as he went right on with his speech.

We congratulate our Canadian neighbors upon the success of the measures of inland improvemen', and hope their competition with the States, in enterprise, in virtue, and in freedom, will be maintained with energy and perseverance.

### UNITED STATES.

FATAL LAKE DISASTERS .- The steamer "Superior" was wrecked in a storm on Lake Superior, near Grand Island, on the 29th ult. Her rudder was carried away, when she became unmanageable, and was driven upon the rocks and went to pieces. Of those on board, sixteen persons were saved and thirty-five lost, including the Captain, H. J. Jones. The barque "J, V. Aver," Captain McClenning, from Chicago for Buffalo, with 17,000 bushels of wheat, is supposed to have foundered in a gale on Lake Michigan, on the 4th inst., and it is feared that all on board were lost. The Captain's trunk and portions of the cabin have been washed ashore at St-Josephs.

Portions of the wreck of the propeller " J W. Brooks" have been seen at the lower end of Lake Ontario. It is not positively known how many passengers she had on board, but it is supposed that about thirty lives were lost by that disaster.

Samuel Welch and Acquilla Gifford, deck hands saved from the propeller "Toledo," have published a statement, in which they say, according to the best of their knowledge, that there were on board the propeller at the time she was lost, the Captain, two mates, three engineers, three firemen, eight deck hands, cook, steward, two porters, two lamp boys, watchman, two wheelsmen, five cabin and twelve steerage passengers, of whom,
