document, the one which will give the greatest satisfaction at home and abroad, for the earnestness and decision thus implied will not be lost upon the enemy. Towards the amicable termination of the forthcoming conference this declaration will contribute largely, and the sincerity of the statement is borne out in another part of the speech, where her Majesty, addressing the House of Commons, declares that the estimates will be framed in such a manner as to provide for the exigencies of war, if peace should unfortunately, not be concluded. From the language which has recently been employed by the Muscovite orgin in the Russian capi al, there can be little doubt that the Czar is sincerely anxious for peace, and nothing will strengthen his good resolution in this respect so much as the quiet but most effective way in which this important topic is handled in the Queen of England's speech to the Imperial Parliament. The speech confirms what was previously known, that the negociations will be opened in Paris. Reference is made to the treaty with Sweden for preserving the balance of power in the north of Europe, and a treaty of friendship, com nerce, and navigation, is declared to have been concluded between this country and the Republic of Chili-the only other foreign topics, irrespective of the war, which are introduced into the decument.

ASSUMED HITCH WITH AMERICA If we are to credit a morning paper which

is known to speak occasionally by the inspira

tion of Downing-street we are by no means nt the end of our troubles with the United States. The misunderstanding with Great Britain, arising out of the enlistment business, -if this authority is worth anything, is far from being settled, for it seems that President Pierce, determined to make "political capital" out of this excitable theme, will not be pacified-will listen to no explanation,, and insists upon the recall of Mr. Cramp on, the British Ambassidar, a non-compliance with which will be followed by the delivery to that func tionary of his passports, and the ejection at the same time of three British Consuls who are charged with having violated the neutrality laws of the United States in the matter of the enlistment. For Intelligence of this serious kind the British public is certainly not prepared, and we suspect that the London paper which makes these starding revelations is indebied for them to the gassip from Washington which appears in the New York and other Journals. But out metropolitan contemporary argues the point in a very bellicose spirit, and is indiscreet enough to talk of the naval armament which, if the war had continued, would be seen in the Baltic and the Euxine in the spring, being employed on the coast of America. "The naval power of England, uever more fully developed than at present," he says, "comprising a force of ships of the statements published about him were true. line, frigates, and mortar and gunboats, in comparison with which the entire navy of the United States is but a weak and squadron, will, with certainty of peace, be set at liberty to act in vindication of the national honour in whatever quarter it may be assailed. The change, therefore which has come over the drama of European politics will, no doub, have its proper weight with all reflecting men in the Uni ed States, and they will wonder whether in a point of mere international punctilio--which has been the subject of explanation and apology-a war should be rashly and wickedly provoked which would sweep American commerce from the seas, and lay the whole scaboard of the Union open to the attacks of the greatest naval power in the world." We have quoted this extract only to condemn i'. Vapouring like this is exactly calculated to bring about the crisis which the writer effects to deplore, and it shows the grossest ignorance of the pubhe feeling of the United States, to suppose that whatever may be the President's policy with regard to his own re-election, the sensible people of the United States would tolerate such madness in the indulgence of a personand mbition. The President is not omnipotent. He cannot plunge the country into war about any whim which he may take-up, and it is well known that he would receive no support from the senate, and very little, in all probability from the House of Representives, if he attempted to provoke hostilitie, between the Powers on such grounds.

References of this kind to ships of the line, and guns and mortar boats, cannot fail to wound the pride of a high-spirited people. It is the act of a bully who, with a heavy bludgeon in his hand, threatens to knock down any one who declares that " black is the white of his eye." Surely it is time enough to write or talk in this style when the danger is imminent, of which we confess we can disc rn few symptoms.

No doubt can exist that the attempt to enlist American citizens on American seil as soldiers in the British army was a sad mistake-one which the English government and its representative in America both regret. At the same time it is susceptible of explanation and apology, and both have been tendered. The very coafes ion of erfor in a case of this kind, ought to disarm hostility, and the published instructions of Mr. Crampton to his subordinates showed a deep anxiety on his cart to keep within the letter of the law. He declared emphatically that if the neutrality laws of the United States were violated by these subor limites, they must expect no support from the B itish Government, and if his instructions had been honestly carried on', the misu iderstanding could not have occurred.

All th t these persons-were empowered to say to any one anxious to enlist was this -- " wher you have passed the American frontier we will offer you such and such terms." When a representation of the facts was made to this Government no time was lost in endeavouring to heal the wounded honour of the United States a fact admitted in the President's message, and Lord Clarendon is known to have tendered each an apology as would have been instantly accepted by any European court. To push the affair beyond this point can have no object but a foul one, and if President Pierre should attempt to do so, the enlightened portions of American society will rise as one man to resent it.

It is well known that the neutrality laws of the United States have been much more grossly violated in former times by the representatives of other Powers, but we do not dwell on this, because, as the homely adage has it, "Two blacks do not make on white" The whole thing lies in a nut shell. It cannot be tortured into a cause of war by any ingenuity which the President and his myrmidons may ad pt; but it bhoves the peaceably inclined on both sides of the Atlantic to keep their eyes open, and prevent by direst which could afflict the world.
