under the same canopy that hid been used for the Pope's Legate. The ceremony of the baptism lasted but a few moments. A great majority of the company, tired with sitting so many hours, left, somewhat indecently, before the ceremony was over. The Emperor, following the example of his uncle, as recorded by M. Thiers, held the child up in his arms as soon as he was baptized, an act saluted by immense cheering. The Emperor and Empress afterwards signed the baptismal register, first witnessed by the Envoy of the Pope. Prince Oscar, of Sweden, then attached his signature, followed by H. I. H. Prince Napoeon, the duchess of Hamilton, and officers of the Strite, and other persons whose testations court etiquette demands on such occasions. The Prince then left by a private door for the Tuileries, and their majesties went to dine at the Hotel de Ville.

"A vast deal of colour and light, of glitter, of noise, and of perfume, mixed with the smell of wax lights-a vision of vague magnificence splendid, but indistinct. This is the uniform effect I have always felt to be that produced by these representations; and I believe that, well examined, it is that felt by most people. However, there were certain details of yesterday' ceremony that were striking enough to produce a lasting impression. For instance, I shall not easily forget the really extraordinary blaze of light eminating from what the Moniteur, with some truth, I believe, calls 'the million of wax candles,' on the high altar. Such an efflores-ence of light could barely be imagined, for, rising, as did each taper, from its gilt sconce or branch of some kind, the flames seemed the incan descent flowers sprung from wonderous stems of gold. And when the blaze of all this effulgent bouquet fell on the mitres and crosses, and the can assure you the coup d'œil was really some thing magical. Then again, a very pretty idea was the way in which the ladies of the court were attired. The Empress herself (who looked remarkably handsome) was all in white, covered with Alencon lace, wearing pearls only for her jewels, and enshrouded in a vast veil of gauzy tissue, that descended from a crown of pearls. Her ladies were also entirely in white, with dresses of the lightest material floating around them like clouds, and with veils also descending from the head, only fastened on by wreaths of roses and other pink and white flowers. The effect was really beautiful."

There can be no doubt but that it was most splendid, but the wisdom of these splendours] very much question. The whole affair has been carried to such a ridiculous extent that it appears to be nothing but a farce, got up for the amusement of the world at the expense of the French people. It is asserted that Cora, who had been legally condemned to death, but respited by the governor, had made such arrangements that he would have obtaired his liberty in a few days, had not the Committee taken his case in hand. The Committee had arrested a large number of suspected persons, and among others, "Yankee Sullivan," the notorious Irish pugilist, formerly of this city. Sullivan committed suicide in his cell, after hav ing made some astounding disclosures in regard to recent election frauds, in San Francisco. While the Vigilance Committee are thus carrying thirgs with a high hand, and have been backed by a quite general pu dic sentiment, there appeared to be, at the time the steamer sailed, a slight reaction, and a somewhat formidable party was being organized to put down the committee, and re-establish the authority of the Courts. Judge Terry, of the Supreme Court, had issued a writ

of habeas corpus demanding the persons of parties held by the Committee, which writ was disregarded. Gov. Johnson had issued a proclamation, calling on the militia of the State to hold themselves in readiness to assist in suppressing the revolutionary movements of the Vigilance Committee, when called upon. It is said that the Governor has had an interview with Gen. Wool, commanding the United States forces on the Pacific coast, and that he had promised his assist tance, in case the State militia should be insufficient to restore order. As the Committee evince a strong disposition to hold on to their self-constituted authority to dispense summary justice, the prospects are that the next arrival will bring advices of a serious civil war in the Golden State.
