I called to them, saying that the night before I had been shrunk and fallen into the ditch, and begged them to help me out. Some refused, but at last some bolder ones helped me, and I was dragged out with much difficulty, as I could scarcely help myself. My hands were cut in many places. I was very lame, and covered with the mud of the ditch above the waist, yet in that condition I had to cross the bridge within gun-shot of the castle. What happened after that I must not tell. The private bands still continue to be played in the Parks on the Sabbath. On Sunday the 8th there were not fewer than 200,000 persons listening to the music in Regent and Victoria Parks. A letter from the Archbishop of Cantebury, to Lord Palmerston has been published, in which he deprecates the government sanction for the allowance of Sunday music in the Parks, and states that he is continually (daily) receiving letters from parties expressive of their feelings on this subject, and who consider the question as to their continuance or discontinuance a vital question as concerns the national religion. Lord Palmerston in his reply says, that his opinion was, and is still, that the performance of military bands for a couple of hours on the Sabbath after divine worship, would afford the people innocent and in tellectual recreation combined with fresh air and healthy exercises, and that such recreation was not at variance with the soundest and purest sentiments of religion. But from the various representations made to him by persons who look upon the matter from a different point of view, and who entertain strong opinions contrary to his own, he was led to ask himself "Whether the advantage gained was sufficiently great to compensate for running counter to the religious feeling, of a large body of the community?" and to this question there could be but one enswer, namely-that it was not. He further says that he will at once take steps for discontinuing band playing in Kensington Gardens and the Parks on Sunday.

What these steps will lead to, is hard to leter. mine, but the religious feelings of the people must not be wounded by their continuance.
