PUBLIC PROCLAMATION OF PEACE.

Yesterday morning great excitement was exhibited in the streets, from St. James's Palace to the Royal Exchange, to witness the proceedings of heralds and their attendants for the proclamation of Peace. Crowds assembled long before twelve o'clock, and waited patiently the arrival of the procession. The streets were cleared of carriages by the police, who maintained an open passage in the middle.

A detachment of Horse Guards was drawn up in front of St. James's Palace, where the High Bailiff and Officers of the City of Westminster

were in attendance at half-past eleven o'clock.

The juvenile members of the Royal Family, with a large number of the children of the nobility, were at the windows of the Palace, and amongst others present were Lord Ernest Bruce, the Vice Chamberlain, Lord Alfred Paget, M.P. the Hon. Mr. Ashley, Sir John Milley Doyle, the officers of the High Stewards' and Chamberlain Department.

The Offiers of Arms, Sergeant at Arms, Sergeant Trumpeter, the Trumpets, Drum-Major, and Drums, assembled in the Stable-yard, St.

At twelve o'clock the proclamation was read at St. James's-gate by Garter; after which, the Officers of Arms, habited in their tabards and mounted, formed a procession in the following order :-

The Sergeant Trumpeter, Detachment of Li e Guards. Beadles of Westminster, two and two with Staves The High Constable on Horseback.

High Bailiff and Deputy Steward of Westminster

Kuight Marshalmen, two and two. Drnmmers, Drum-Major. Trumpets, Sergeant Trumpeter.

Sergeant-at Arms. Pursuivant. Heralds. Sergeant-at-Arms. Life Guards.

At Charing-cross, the procession halted and the Officer-of-Arms read the Proclamation, which was received with loud choers by a large concourse of cople. The procession then moved forward up the Strand, and was frequently cheered in its pro-

On arriving at Temple Bar, the gates of which were, at first open, the procession halted for some minutes, during which the gates were closed. It appeared as if the cortege had arrived before the The Junior Pursuivant-of-Arms, going out of

the rank between two trumpeters, rode up to the gates, and the frumpets having sounded thrice, he gave a loud knock. The Trumpets and Guards in waiting conducted the Pursuivant back to his place in the procession, which then moved on into the city the officers of Westminster filing off as they

The trumpets sounded thrice, and the proclamation was read a third time, after which the trumpet again sounded thrice, the spoctator: cheering. The procession then passed forward to Cheapside, when it again halted at the end of Wood-st, and the proclamation was once more read. The procession then advanced to the Royal Exchange, where the proclamation was read for the last time.

A FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT, resulting in the instant death of two young women, occurred at Newton Corner, on the Boston and Worcester Railroad, yesterday afternoon.
