EUROPE.

From late European Papers.

The London Times says that though the harvest has been abundant, there is no prospect of prices receding to a point injurious to agriculturist or agricultural interests. From the continent the harvest accounts are still more favorable.

Westmacott, the scuptor, is dead. The American ship Ocean Home and the Cherubim came to collision Friday morning, off Lizard. The former sunk in twenty minutes, taking down 75 passengers. She was from Rotterdam bound to New York with immigrants. The captain of the Ocean Home, with 21 of the passengers and crew, had landed at Plymouth. The Charubim was but slightly damaged, and proceeded to London. The second mate, steward, and four seamen of the Ocean Home got into the long boat, but their fate is doubtful.

Spain.—The cholera had disappeared from Madrid and but few cases are reported in other parts of the country. The Cortes had been dissolved by a Royal decree which was well received by the people. Six Madrid newspapers had been seized by the Govern-

Ministers have been appointed to Chili. Costa Rica, and Equador but government does not intend to appoint a new Minister to Mexico, and it is reported intends recalling her Minister from Berlin.

SWITZERLAND, -An insurrection has taken place in the Canton of Neufchatel. The Royalist or Prussian party seized the chateau. arrested the Councillor of State, and hoisted the Prussian flag. The federal party subseque tly retook the town, and arrested Count Pourtalis, the insurgent leader. Twelve Prussians were killed.

ITALY.-Italian affairs remain unsettled. The Paris correspondent of the Times says it is certain a second note has been addressed by Naples to France and England of a more conciliatary nature. The Sardinian army is to be increased. Count Cavour has addressed a note to the Sarlinian ministers at foreign Courts, declaring that this measure has been adopted solely in consequence of the policy of Austria, and intimates decidedly that Sardinia will not tolerate Austrian intervention

The difficulty between the American Vice Consul at Ancona and the Austrian Colonel remains unsettled, Mr. Cass, the American Minister, to whom application had been made for redress, being absent from Rome.

FRANCE.—The Cashier of the Northern Railroad of France has absconded. He is a defacter to the amount of 1,000,000 francs. Turkey.-Diplomatic relations were resumed with Russia on the 25th of August.

MISCELLANEOUS .- Sierra Leone dates are to July 30. The rains had been unprecedently heavy, and trade was dull.

The Ascent of Mount Ararat by Five Englishmen.

To the Editor of the London Times,-

SIR: On the 11th inst., a party, consisting of Major Alick J. Fraser, the Rev. Walter Thursby, Mr. James Theobold, jr., of Winchester, Mr. John Evans of Darley Abbey. Derbyshire, and myself, started from Bayazid on this expedition. We were accompanied by two servants and a zaptieh, or native policeman, and by the kindness of the Kaimakan, Hadjee Mustapha Effendi, we we'e consigned to the charge of Issak Bey, a chief of the Ararat Kurds, under whose safeguard we had nothing to fear from the plundering habits of his followers. At Bayazid we had provided ourselves each with a stout pole between five and six feet long, furnished with a spike at one end and a hook at the other.

Crossing the plain of Araret, we commenced the ascent through a wide ravine, inclosed between vast ridges of volcanic rick. For three hours we wound our way through rugged defiles, occasionally traversing fertile plateaus, verdant with growing crops of wheat and barley. Our sure-footed little horses, accustomed to this sort of work, picked their way through the most break-neck places, and brought us in safety to the black goats' hair tents of our host, which were pitched on some pasture lands on the southern slope of Greater Ararat, about 8,000 feet above the level of the sea. Hither the Kurds resort in Summer with their flocks and herds, returning to the villages of the plain at the approach of

A portion of the chief's tent was set apart for our use; the floor was covered with gaycolored carpets, a fat sheep was killed, and everything was supplied that Kurdish hospitality could suggest.

At 3 o'clock next morning we were on the move, all except Mr. Thursby, who, to our regret, was obliged by indisposition to remain in t e tent. Three hours of continued ascent on foot brought us to the base of the cone. Here Maj. Fraser bore off to the south east and took a line of his own, while Mr. Theobald, Mr. Evans and I commenced the ascent on the southern side, keeping to the snow, which presented an unbroken surface to the very summit.

To my two friends, who are experienced Alpine climbers, this was easy work, but it soon began to tell unfavourably on my customed limbs. For a time we kept pretty well together; by degrees, however, Mr. Theobald began to forge ahead, followed by Mr. Evans, while I brought up the rear as well as I could. But my strength was fast giving way, and when about half way up the cone I found myself utterly unable to proceed any further. Accordingly, there being no alternative but to descend, I sat on the snow and shot down with the velocity of an arrow, undoing in a few minutes the laborious toil of nearly three hours. This was a keen dis-

From an elevation of about 14,000 feet above the sea we saw the sun rise in unclouded majesty, lightening up simultaneously to our view vast tracts of the Russian, Persian and Turkish empires; that was a glorious sight never to be forgotten.

About 1,200 feet from the simmit, we came upon an oak cross that had been fixed there in the rock by Prof. Abich, in the year 1845; it was in perfect preservation, and the inscription, in Russian characters, was still

This was the most difficult part of our ascent; the obstructions were frequent, and the climbing at times perilous; but caution and perseverance enabled us to overcome everything, and at 9 A. M. we had the satisfaction of standing on the highest point of the mountain. Here I stuck to the hilt in the snow a kama or short double-edged sword, which we found at the foot of Abich's cross. Here, also, as loval Britons, we drank the health of our beloved Queen, in brandy. Her Majes'y will perhaps deign to except this expression of allegiance on considering that hers is probably the first name that has been pronounced on that solemn height since it was quitted by the great patriarch of the human race; for no record or tradition exists of the ascent having ever been made before, although repeatedly tried by men of different countries, both European and Asiatic. Prof. Abich made several attempts, but failed in all, as is proved by the position of the cross, by the testimony of the natives, and even by the confession of his own countrymen.

We descended on the tracks of the others, and got back to the tents about 4 P. M. The whole surface of Mount Ararat bears

evidence of having been subjected to violent volcanic action, been seemed and scored with deep ravines. The rocky ridges that protrude from the snow are either basalt or tufa: and near the summit we found some bits of pumice on a spot which still emits a strong sulphurous smell.

The summit itself is nearly level, of a triangular shape, the base being about 200 No. 13, NORTH SIDE OF PRINCESS STREET, yards in length, the perpendicular about 300. The highest point is at the apex of the triangle, which points nearly due west; separated from it by a hollow is another point of nearly equal attitude, and the base of the triangle is an elevated ridge, forming a third eminence. These three points stand out in distinct relief on a clear day.
