## UNITED STATES.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.—The New York Journal of Commerce, a paper in the Buchanan interest says :- " The election of James Buchanan to the Presidency of the United States for the next four years from the 4th of March next, is now put beyond all doubt. He is elected by a large majority. Both Houses of Congress will be largely De-

The Journal thus proceeds to sum up the vote in the several States of the Union, and shows the following result. For Buchanan the Emperor is further represented as having 174, Col Frement 114, majority for Buchanan, 66.

NICARAGUA. - Recent advices from Nica. ragua fully confirm previous accounts of the bloody battles of Massaya and Granada .-The loss of Walker's force in these engage ments was about sixteen killed, and twenty slightly wounded, while that of the enemy amounted to eleven hundred men. The latter report states that the enemy was retreating from Massaya, and that General Walker would set out in pursuit as soon as his troops hal somewhat recovered from the fatigue of a fight of forty-eight hours duration. Mr. Wneeler, the American Minister, was lying dangerously all, having experienced an attack apoplexy.

The first snow storm of the season came off Friday. It visited Philadelphia, Balti-more, and Washington, on the South, and extended westward as far as Oswego, where snow fell to the depth of one foot. In this city the air was very raw and generally uppleasant, but no snow fell.

CUBA. - Litest advices from Havana report that the Cubans were in a high excitement in anticipation of a successful warlike demonstration against Vera Cruz. A vessel of war sailed from Havana on the 17th ult., with munitions of war, and probably other material aid, for the newly-crea ed Spanish subjects of San Domingo, who are expected to revolutionize that republic with all convenient lispatch.

The Herald's correspondent, writing on the 24th says :- "The naval prep rations for operations against Mexico are on a magnincent scale, and all our marijum warriors are sharpening their weapons for a fight. The arsenals are in full blast, and abundan ce of supplies will accompany the Spanish armada to Vera Cruz."

CALIFORGIA .-- The United States mail steamship Illinois arrived from Aspinwall on passengers, and nearly seventeen thousand dellars in gold. The news by this arrival is not very important. The people of California were very much engaged in the canvass of the approaching election. The amount of treasure shipped from San Francisco during the month of September last, was \$1. 570,371. The Supreme Court has recently decided a suit in favour of Mesick vs. Sag decland, by which the former gets a title to one-third of the city of Sacramento, worth \$3,000,000. The schooner Carlew, with merchandise and passengers, left San Francisco on the 19th of September, without her clearance papers, and is supposed to have gone to j in General Walker, in Nicaragua. Business appears to be rather dull, and speculation at a very ow ebb. The current rate of discount is 2 per cent, per month, but money can brob mael on gril red estate securities, such as fire-proof buildings, at 13 per month, and sometimes as low as I per cent.
