FATAL ACCIDENT .- It becomes our melan choly task to announce the sudden death of Mr. Henry Saunders, son of the Hon. John Simcoe Saunders, of Frederiction. The circmstances, so far as we are able to learu then. are these :- He attended a meeting of the Masonic Lodge last evening, which place he left between 10 and 11 o'clock.
