

DOMESTIC.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—It becomes our melancholy task to announce the sudden death of Mr. Henry Saunders, son of the Hon. John Simon Saunders, of Fredericton. The circumstances, so far as we are able to learn, are these:—He attended a meeting of the Masonic Lodge last evening, which place he left between 10 and 11 o'clock. Afterwards he left town in a carriage, on a shooting excursion, in company with another gentleman, Mr. James Johnson, their object being to go early on the shooting ground in Lincoln next morning; and when about two miles from the City, one of their guns went off accidentally, the whole contents passing through his side, and causing his immediate death. Most deeply does the whole community sympathize with the parents and friends of the deceased young gentleman, in this their most distressing bereavement.—*Fredericton Reporter* Sept. 12.

FIRE AT ST. ANDREWS.—We learn that a fire broke out at St. Andrews early on Thursday morning, which consumed about twelve buildings. It originated in a cooper's shop, Water street, near Street's Wharf, but the origin is not known. We have not learned the amount of damage done, by this conflagration.—*New Brunswick*.

MILITARY STORES. have arrived here by Steamer *Ada* from Halifax. Sixty tons of powder and twelve tons of shot have been landed, and the former conveyed to Fort Howe. Ten Artillery men accompanied the ammunition. We believe considerable activity may be looked for in military matters here. It is said the fortifications are to be improved and strengthened, and other works in connection with defences commenced. A government landing stage is wanted at Partridge Island, and there is nothing of the sort at Fredericton. We believe that the effect of General Eyre's visit will be to place us less under the influence of Halifax, the defences of which have been vastly improved while ours have been left in a state of comparative decrepitude.—*Courier*.

The receipt, from Halifax, of letters and papers by the *Cambridge*, was delayed by an accident happening to the steamer *Creole*, which prevented her from making her usual trip to Windsor on Friday morning. We understand the piston rod and connecting rod of the engine was broken. A tug was despatched hence on Saturday which brought her here from Nova Scotia to have the damage repaired. The mail arrived by land route yesterday.—*Courier*.

FRENCH CONSUL.—James W. Wolhaupter Esq., has been appointed French Vice Consular Agent, at Miramichi.

CORONER'S INQUEST.—An inquest was held in Canterbury on the 27th August, before Henry Jones, Esquire, one of the Coronors for the County of York, on the body of a colored man, found floating in the River, supposed to be Wilby or Wilber.—*Royal Gazette*.

EX-JUDGE T. C. HALIBURTON of our Supreme Court has, we believe, taken a final farewell of Nova Scotia as a place of residence. Clifton, his beautiful seat at Windsor, sold some weeks since, and the old Judge took passage for Liverpool in last week's steamer, to make his home in Great Britain for the remainder of his days.—*Halifax Recorder*.

ACCIDENT.—While two young men belonging to Milton were out shooting on Monday last, one of them, John Sheffer, having rested his hand on the muzzle of his gun, had the whole charge, consisting of shot and wadding, lodged in his wrist by the gun going off accidentally. Surgical aid having been obtained the charge was extracted with fragments of bones, which were shattered in the hand and wrist on the side opposite to which the charge entered. Fears are entertained that amputation of the hand will yet be necessary.—*Liverpool N. S. Transcript*.

EUROPE.

(By Telegraph to News Room.)

ARRIVAL OF THE CAMBRIA.

The "Cambria," which sailed from Liverpool about 10 on the morning of Saturday, the 30th ult., with 76 passengers for Boston, arrived at Halifax yesterday at 11 p.m.

The "Arabia," was taken into dock for examination, and was found to have keel slightly damaged, consequently the *Cambria* takes her place, but the *Arabia* will be despatched as an extra ship on Sept. 4th, for Halifax and Boston.

ENGLAND.—The Tory organs state that the Conservative party is likely to arrange its internal differences with a view to a grand attempt to overthrow the Palmerston Administration. Queen and Prince of Orange remain at Southampton unrecognized by the Queen of England.

British Royal family have gone to Scotland for the season.

FRANCE.—Political news dull as ever. Debates says, wherever political activity may exist in Europe at present, certainly none exists in France. The Emperor will make rather a long stay at Biarritz.

Another prosecution of members of secret societies is going on at Dijon. An anonymous but circumstantial contradiction has been published of Louis Blanc—statements as to the oracles induced on French political prisoners at Cayenne.

BERLIN.—The "Kreuz Zeitung" is authorized to contradict all recent statements as to the proposed Orleans manifesto, &c.

Shocks of an earthquake were felt throughout Algeria on the 21st, but were slight. At Philippeville on the 22nd, successive shocks occurred, and several villages destroyed, but little loss of life.

SPAIN.—Spain papers now say that the difficulty between Spain and Mexico is definitely arranged.

Madrid journals of the 23rd say that the

Gazette is about to publish decrees for the dissolution of the Cortes, regulation of the Press, and the establishment of the Council of State, promulgating the Constitution of 1845. The Public and Parliamentary state that the condition to which the Press is reduced, prevent their making any comment on the decree for the dissolution of the National Guard. The Diario expresses approbation of the measure.

The Gazette contains decrees dismissing 16 Civil Governors of Provinces, and appointing successors, selected half from the Moderate and Progressive parties—Bravo Murillo, Gonzalez and Romero, and Beltrán Delis, ex-ministers about to return to Spain. At Barcelona 187 persons condemned by court martial, had been embarked for Cuba, and other colonies.

The Captain General of Catalonia had decreed a dissolution of all associations of workmen and masters in the Province.

Madrid.—Letters from a Ministerial source say, the Ministers continue to be perfectly united among themselves, and the Queen places every confidence in them.

The marriage contract between the Infanta Amelia and Prince Adalbert of Bavaria has been signed at the Palace.

Belgium.—The Free Trade Congress Committee at Brussels continue to receive the adhesion of influential political persons in England and other countries. Nearly every Chamber of Commerce has appointed one or more of their members to attend.

The Provisional Commission for organizing the Congress consists of five of the most influential political economists, and the appeal is chiefly made to practical men to come forward and enable Congress to reach a practical result.

Prussia.—Grand maneuvers of Prussian troops are going on at St. Georg on the Rhine. Reported erection of a line of fortresses around Berlin is confirmed. Plan is not a connected chain of forts like Paris, but detached redoubts to cover each other's fire. We have nothing definite as to the reported expedition against the Riff pirates, but English government papers have become suddenly anxious that the matter should be left to settlement by the Emperor of Morocco.

Italy.—Austria's official journals repeat their denial of any increase to the Austrian forces in Italy, but admit that the corps d'armee therein is already complete to war strength.

A letter addressed to the Milan Gazette affirms positively that Ciceruacchio was drowned in endeavouring to cross the Po, and it defies Garibaldi to prove the assertion that he was shot by Austrians.

The reported disaffection in part of the Neapolitan army is confirmed, but seems to arise from a local grievance—certain regiments having been ordered to work on the Railway.

A letter in a Frankfurt Journal professes to give analysis of the King of Naples's reply to the Western Powers, which it says has been misrepresented. The King considers the interference of the Western Powers as an encroachment on his kingdom's independence, and not justified by actual circumstances, consequently he refuses to recognize such interference. He does not refuse the suggested reforms, but considers the Neapolitan Government the best judge of the opportunity. He does not say as reported, that he will repel force by force, but hints that if any real cause of grievance exists on the part of the Western Powers, he is open to a European Congress.

TURKEY.—The Porte is now about to adopt measures for the chastisement of the Montenegro for recent outrages.

The Porte has also given renewed assurances to the allied powers, that the concessions in favour of Christians will be respected.

There is talk of a tax on Tobacco, estimated to realise two hundred million Pistres.

Russia.—The Russians have withdrawn most of their troops from the Crimea.

The garrison at Sebastopol is very small and the Cavalry are but a few Cossacks.

Russia has extended the four days quarantine to all the frontiers of Bessarabia on the Moldavian side.

Petersburg letters continue to revel in descriptions of glories of the foreign embassies to the approaching coronation.

Diplomatic corps are to be conveyed to Moscow, on September 24. Special train conveyed Crown Jewels, Scriptures, Orbs, and different Crowns of all the Russias.

Treasures were exposed to open carriages and an immense crowd looked on in admiration.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—Colonial Parliament is prorogued till October 22d. Nothing respecting any Caffre outbreak.

A project of Military Colonization of the Frontier finds favour in the colony.

INDIA.—Telegraphic anticipations of the Mail from Calcutta on the 17th, and Bombay to the 30th July are received.

The heir to the throne of Burmah had been assassinated.

Export trade brisk. Freight £2 to London and Liverpool.

STILL LATER.

Arrival of the "Arabia."

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.

The Atlantic took out a full despatch, but the news was not of much importance. Today adds little or nothing of interest.

London says—It need not any longer be concealed that Governments of France and England, and that is to say, Louis Napoleon and Lord Palmerston are not on good terms with respect to Spanish affairs, and communications are said to have passed between them of anything but a complimentary character.

We may as well state in addition that an opinion has found its way to the other side of the Atlantic, that England is ready to make concessions in order to obtain the friendship of the United States, and that this determination has been come to in event of a probable rupture with France. The improved tone of the London journals is interpreted in this sense, and the New York Herald makes much of the topic.

We have hitherto hesitated to say so because they are matters of great importance, and should not be paraded merely for sake of raising public excitement; but as the Paris correspondents of our own press now begin to talk about the matter, reserve must be set aside, and the public be instructed that while there may in reality be no danger, it is al-

ways dangerous to have our foreign policy under the direction of a Premier like Palmerston. Star further says, contemporary announcements that the Central American difficulty is solved amicably by a convention and treaty between Honduras and Great Britain.

The satisfactory settlement alluded to of this at one time threatening question, was announced five weeks since. The health of the Emperor of the French undergoes much discussion—that the Emperor has a serious malady of a dangerous character may be inferred, but its exact nature is concealed from the public.

Spanish Government has not yet published its decrees dissolving the Cortes, and fixing a new Election. Expiration of its policy to be looked for therein, still remains the subject of discussion.

Latest dates—Lisbon was tranquil, but circumstances had occurred to show that the late riot was essentially political in its sources.

In Italy, discontent is spreading into the Legislature, and alarm exists in Naples in consequence of the now ascertained movement of the Muratist party, which has been circulating a programme of proclamation at Naples with secrecy and activity.

LATEST—Kent from Melbourne a. r. Dartmouth on Tuesday afternoon with 82,000 ozs. of gold. Trade satisfactory. Gold £3 17s 6d.

The campaign projected by the Russians against the Circassians is indefinitely postponed.

The Times is officially authorized to declare that a report to the effect that the Portuguese Government applied to the British for a squadron on occasion of the recent riots at Lisbon, is destitute of foundation.

The Persian Ambassador in Paris is to proceed to London to terminate the Anglo-Persian dispute by offering full satisfaction to England on condition that Mr. Marcy be recalled.

The Times has another leader on Mr. Marcy's proposal respecting merchant ships in time of war.
