THE INSURRECTION IN SICILY .- Paris, Tuesday Morning.-A despatch has been received from Naples, dated the 7th, announcing that the insurrection in Sicily has been suppressed, and that Bentivegna has been made prisoner.

BARON BENTIVEGNA .- The Catholico gives the following account of the leader of the insurrectionary movement in Sicily :- "A certain Baron Bentivegna was incarcerated, several months ago, on suspicion of being concerned in a conspiracy. A few days since his case was brought befere the authorised tribunal, which decided that there was no ground for any further proceedings against him, and the Baron was restored to liberty. Bentivegna then repaired to a place called Bellifrate, in the interior of Sicily, where, as a land proprietor of the district, he had many persons dependent upon him. He immediately presented himself to the local authorities of the neighborhood (or rather to the sole representative of those authorities, an individual collector of taxes), and declared himself to be, from that moment, actual head of the Government. With the help of his dependents and followers, it was easy for him to open the doors of the prisons. and release some twenty of the men who had been confined there. He thus found himself the leader of a band of forty men. The Government has sent troops to march against these insurgents, and at the time when the last steamboat left Sicily the latter had been surrounded by the military, and it was impossible for them to escape, as they were encompassed on every side."

Austrian Italy -The Austrian authorities are using every effort in Milan to get some respectable Italians to meet the Einperor. The nobles have agreed not to present themselves, unless forced to do so by the gendarmes. Not one independent family will take a place at La Scala for the proposed fetes. This intelligence is dated Milan, Nov. 29.

STORMS IN THE MEDITERRANEAN .- ACcording to a despatch from Marseilles, there has been very stormy weather in the Mediterranean. The Castor, a steamer which is employed between France and the Italian ports, was driven on the coast of Sardinia. Nine trading vessels have been wrecked.

Australia. - By the arrival of the True, Briton, we have received files of papers from Melbourne to the 12th of Sept. inclusive.

The gold fields, which every experiment and inquiry shows to be inexhaustible, are yielding a larger produce, and new ones are being opened in all directions.

The gold escort returns, for two weeks, ending Aug. 30th, and Sept. 6th, give a total for the year of 1 804,044 oz. The escort from the Ovens arrived in town on Monday evening with 11,202 oz.

Mineral and other wealth appear to in-

crease almost daily. We boast (says the Melbourne Herald) of our own slate, stone, marble, in several localities; and we have this week seen a specimen of stone from a newly discovered quarry at Western Port, which promises to be very valuable for foot-pavements and other purposes. Two vessels were despatched yesterday, and are expected to arrive here again in a week or two with full cargoes enough of the stone being easily obtained to pave the whole of Melbourne. Large quantities of silver, and tin, copper, and iron, as well as coal, are now within our reach, and are gradually being introduced into use and for export. Black manganese is also found largely, and a shipment of a considerable quantity of it to England is about to be made as an experiment. With her growing population, and her increasing resources, Victoria may indeed cry "Onward!"
