DESPATDH TO THE EAST INDIA HOUSE. ALEXANDRIA, Dec. 5.

Intelligence has been received from Bomvay to the 17th of November. Sir Colin Campbell reached Cawnpore or

Nov. 4th, and cressed the Ganges on the 9th, en route to Lucknow with 5000 men of all arms. General Wyndham commands the reserve at Cawnpore.

Colonel Greathed's column arrived at Cawnpore on the 26th Oct., and proceeded on the 31st under command of Brigadier Grant-being reinforced to 5000 strong with a large supply of provisions, to Alumbagh, where he awaits the arrival of the Commander-in-Chief.

The Dinapore mutineers were driven from a strong position at Binder, near Guttahpore, by a detatchment of 500 men, under Colonel Power, of 53rd Foot. Two-guns captured, but with severe loss. Col Power killed.

The accounts from Saugor and Jubblepore unsatisfactory. Major Erskine earnestly demanded assistance Brigadier Stewart's col-umn on the road to Mhow has been directed

to proceed thither. The contigent at Mahedapore mutinied on Nov. Sth, and killed two of their officers ; but a telegraphic despatch just received states that they were attacked by the Mhow field force, and routed with the loss of all their guns. All I
