The subject of Railways has for many years been prominent in this Province—after mature consideration, I am of opinion, that the scheme of 1855 is too expensive, and one which the present condition of our population and finances will not fully justify.

European and North American immigration to Saint Andrews and the Gallies as most important to the Province at present; and so far as any future legislation may be required for those lines, I will, if returned, do my best to promote their completion.

The Fisheries of New Brunswick, on account of increasing importance, demand a careful consideration. Should endeavour, if elected, to protect the interests of those engaged in this branch of our commerce.
