NEWFOUNDLAND .- Light on Green Isle, Catalina Harbor .- The Colonial Government at Newfoundland has given notice that on and after the 1st day of March 1857, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse re-cently erected on Green Isle, on the S. side of the entrance of Catalina harbor, Trinity Bay, on the E. coast of Newfoundland. The light is a fixed white light, and will be visible seaward from the deck of a ship in a favorable state of the atmosphere at a distance of 8 miles from ENE, round southerly to SW. The lighthouse consists of a keeper's dwelling, of wood, of a story and a half high, with a pitched roof, through the centre of which rises a low stone tower surmounted by a lantern, the height from the base to the top being 32 eet. About the first day of June next this light, which is temporary, will be replaced by a more powerful light of the same character, the illuminating ap-paratus being a lens of the fourth order. Treaty with Morocco.

Our friendly relations with Oriental, or a least with Mohommedan Powers, have been extended by the ratification of an advantageous treaty with the Sultan of Morocco. By similar arrangements, Egypt and Tunis were already brought into amicable association with the West; Algiers is French by conquest and colonization; and the treaty now announced completes the connection between Europe and Africa, from the isthmus of Suez to the Straits of Gibraltar. After two years negociation, Mr. Hay, our Consul-General at Tangier, has succeeded in concluding a treaty between the Queen of Great Britain and the Sultan of Morocco and Fez. The whole terntory will be open to British travellers and residents, on the footing of the most favoured nations. They will have the right to hire houses ; with exemption from taxation, millitary service, forced loans, domiciliary visitation, and search, and with security of property and person, on a par with the sub-jects of the Sultan in the British dominions. In the face of those circumstances, it is satisfactory to record that the consumptive demand for wood has not suffered any abatement : indeed the requirements of consumers in most of the leading articles continue not only unimpaired but are only keeping up to the average extent experienced at this early period of the year.

PINE TIMBER.—Several cargoes of last year's arrival from Quebec have been sold, but their prices have not been made public. Quebec is worth from 18d. to 19d. per foot for an average, of 70 feet; St. John of 18 inch average, we quote at 21d. ; other ports range from 16d. to 17d. per


