If they arise from the Executive now having the Initiation, he would direct the attention of his hon, colleague (Mr. Boyd) to the fact, that not one of the mem. bers of this Government voted for yielding the Initiation. He (Mr. G.) did not wish the people of this country to be misled, with reference to this matter.

A Bill introduced by Mr. Gillmor was under discussion to-day, Mr. Perley in the Chair. Mr. Gillmor stated in few words the nature of the Bill, said that as he was aware it would be opposed he would meet the objections to the Bill in his general reply? The Bill was opposed in short speeches from Mr. Johnston, Mr. Street, Mr. Kerr, Dr. Earle, and Mr. Mitchel. These gentlemen for the most part, thought that the Bill would fail to accomplish the object intended, as it would be more difficult for poor dectors to get bail for the limits, should the limits be extended to the whole country, and further that creditors have no protection.

Mr. Hatheway, and Mr. Boyd warmly supported the Bill. Mr. McLellan, supported the Bill, inasmuch as it only vested an additional power, in the respective Court of Sessions whh are well prepared to judge of any necessities arising from the peculiar circumstances of any county. He thought the present law, shewed a manifest injustice in its provisions, and he contended that one debtor

should not be oppressed more than another. Mr. Gillmor reviewed the several arguments that had been urged against the Bill under discussion, stated that if his hon. colleague (Mr. Street) was sincere when he expressed his opinion in favor of the abolition of imprisonment for debt, he should expect him to support the Bill. He (Mr. G.) was in favour of abolishing imprisonment for debt, and would support a Bill to remove from the statutes such a relict of cruelty, the present bill was a step in that direction. This bill. he said, contemplated giving to the sessions of each county, the power to enlarge the juil limits to the whole extent of the county, if they thought proper. He believed it was unfair to give persons residing in the shire town where the jail was, a preference over others; for instance, in Charlotte, a poor debtor residing in St. George, must leave his occupation, and his family, and go to St. Andrews, there to remain in idleness, dragging out a miserable existence on 5s. a week to pay his board; while his wife and little ones were starving at home. He thought a creditor had all he ought to have, when he got the man's property, and having given up all, the poor debtor should be free, and he believed that merchants were quite as anxious to dispose of their goods as other men were o purchase; and in the business of this cougry, it was a kind of understanding that the risk was mutual; if a merchant advances a man supplies to go into the woods or to build a ship, and the operation turns out unprofitable, all that ought to be expected of the man is to pay what he can, and give up to his creditors his property; and the creditor ought not to have it in his power either to incarcerate the poor debtor or put him on the limits in order that he may trap some friend who might go the debtor's bail for the limits. He thought it looked a little suspicious, to see the legal profession arrayed so generally against it. He thought the opposition to the Bill was not consistent with the liberality which some hon, members professed. Should a debtor act dishonestly, he should then be dealt with accordingly; but to punish so ma ny honest men as are being punished, under the present system, for fear one rogue might escape; appeared to him to be very wrong.

Persia.—Our foreign news is not of a definite or reliable character. The Moniteur de l' Armee publishes some details, for which it must be responsible, relative to the movements of the Persian troops. The Court of Teheran was aware of the departure of the British squadron for the Persian Gulf long before its arrival, but it did not expect its territory would have been invaded without the usual preliminary declaration of war. In order to be prepared for all events, the Shah had formed a corps of 30,000 men, intended to act in the southern part of the empire. Such was the position of affairs when he heard at the same time of the arrival of the British expedition and the capture of Bushire. On hearing this news the Shah assembled the Divan, and it was resolved that the corps commanded by Mirza Mehemed Khan should move forward and take a position to cover the province of Farsistan, of which the English had occupied the coast in such an unexpected manner. On the 7th of January, Fezlali Khan, who commands the first division of the army of the south, quitted Kashan, his head-quarters, by orders received from Teheran, with his first brigade, to proceed to the defile of Zindjeran; on the frontiers of Farsistan. At the same time he commanded Emineh Khen, who commands the second brigade of his division, who was at Hamadan, to march to the same place and join him. Those orders were punctually executed, and by the last accounts the two generals were together on the 14th of January in the Province of Farsistan, whiteer Mirza Mehemed Khan was hastening at the head of two other divisions." We learn by telegraph from Paris, conveying ment of seven hundred men from Bombay had arrived at Bushire.
