

The garrison of Lucknow, in spite of its successful sorties, cannot yet be considered safe. According to the latest advices, they were reduced to three hundred and fifty soldiers in effective condition, encumbered with a helpless band of women and children of the same number. It is true that the 5th and 90th regiments, after having been sent up and down the Ganges, had at last arrived at Allahabad, and were, on September 6, to be marched for Cawnpore, by Gen. Outram. Yet, on the other hand, the rebels had taken up a strong position on the Oude side of the Ganges, opposite to Cawnpore, on the only road to Lucknow practicable at this season of the year; while letters from Buxar mention that the people from Oude were crossing over in crowds to Allahabad. The evacuation by the British of Goruckpoor, situated in a north easterly direction from Oude, would seem to be a step in the right direction. But nothing can yet be regarded as secure. There is still a possibility that the great strategic lines of the upper Ganges and the Jumna may be lost by the English before the arrival of their reinforcements.

The following account of Havelock's ninth victory, merely mentioned in the despatches, is graphic and interesting: Cawnpore, Aug. 18.—Our ninth action came off the day before yesterday, at Bithoor, when the enemy, principally Sepoys of the 34th, 42nd, and 38th regiments—numbering between 3000 and 4000, with two guns—had taken up a position in front of Bithoor, or rather a village to the west of it. Their position was naturally one of the strongest that could be, but instead of making a defence in rear, they made it in front of the bridge.

Our right was towards the Ganges, and our left ran a deep nullah, to the left of which were houses and a high ground. The space in front was tolerably clear, and the enemy occupied some low ground and a village on their left. The road took a sudden turn to the left where the enemy's guns were placed.

The rebels opened their guns on us, and some of their cavalry and infantry circled round our left. We sent a few shots among them, and they bolted. Our force then deployed into line, and on getting within 600 yards, commenced to play on the tops occupied by the Panders. A heavy fire was kept up by us for some time with our guns. The sharp crack of the musket, and the soft, smooth sound of the Enfield rifle now began. On our men went, and drove the enemy out of the gardens, tops and villages to the right. A few determined Jacks made a brave stand near the bridge, and others of them were bayoneted in the village. Our fellows were too tired to chase them, the day being very hot, and we had a march of about twelve miles. The most extraordinary thing is that the enemy did not defend the rising ground and houses on the south side of the ravine.

They went right away and we after them as fast as the guns could go; much time of course was lost in crossing the bridge, and we saw little more of them. The road was lined with houses and gardens, surrounded with mud embankments, and suddenly an attack was made from behind these mud walls on our baggage. A little of it was lost, and several of the camp followers killed. Some Sowars also rushed down at some stragglers behind the rear guard and cut up four or five of them. The coolies of course bolted, and the blackguard villagers came and plundered the property. There was not much lost, but some officers lost all they took with them. We bivouacked during the night to the south of the city. As it was found impossible to take the heavy guns on to Sheorapore, we returned yesterday, having lost, I believe, about 14 killed and 30 wounded. We took the two guns, and must have killed a large number of the enemy, but it was impossible to tell the number of their killed, the water among the rest, to conceal their dead.

The Governor General and Council have issued instructions relative to the treatment of captured mutineers, "least measures of extreme severity should be too hastily resorted to, or carried too far."

Lord Canning had refused to conply with the request of the people of Calcutta, that he would proclaim another martial law.

The mutineers inside Delhi now numbered 17,000 men, of whom one-fourth were cavalry.

The waters of the Ganges and the Jumna are higher than ever. The excessive rains render the march of troops very difficult.

The Calcutta Bengal Hurkera, of September 9th, says the garrison of Lucknow now consists of about 500 men, of whom about 150 are in hospital; there are, also, about 300 women and children. Their relief is secure.

All the wounded Sepoys, or deserters, declare that the cartridge question was the sole cause of the revolt.

An officer, at Almorah, in a letter of the 21st of July, thus explains the cake mystery so much talked about:

"The Mussulmans have fooled the Hindoos into joining them by the chapatty business. Perhaps you do not understand that part of it. You know the army was gained by making the most of our Government cartridges for the Enfield rifles, and all the soi-disant Emperor of Delhi had to do was to gain the Hindoos, the land owners to his interests. He got a chapatty made, and sent it to the head of a village in the name of our Government. This man was ordered to make another chapatty, and send it to the next village, and so on to all the villages in the north-west provinces, if not throughout the presidency. When this had been done by our orders, as it appeared, the Emperor caused a rumor to be circulated that the first chapatty had been filled with cow's bones, and that the man who touched it lost his caste, and as he was to make the next chapatty, the man who touched what he had made lost his also, and so on throughout the country and that the Government had imagined this ingenious expedient for destroying caste, and compelling the conversion to Christianity of all Hindoos at once. It succeeded but too well, and it will be difficult to divest the natives of the false impressions thus given."
