On a wel stormy day, the power of the battery has to be much increased. The test already applied to the transmitting power of the cable, is therefore, the strongest that could have been applied, namely, the use of the smallest quantity of electricity, to travel through the greatest amount of space.

DOUGLAS JERROLD .- The Liverpool Mercury states Mr. Douglas Jerrold did not die in poverty, as has been supposed. Shortlybefore death he had insured his life for £2500; he was besides, a saving man, and his widow, it is stated, will have an income of £600 a year. The British Parliament, in a recent act, has provided that the loss of more than £20 in one day by gaming, or than by £200 in the year preceding insolvency, shall bar a bankrupt's title to obtain his certificate. that the supply of gold from California and Australia would be considerable and permanent, political economists foresaw a diminution of the value of that metal, which would show itself in a general advance in the prices of other commodities. And this result, in point of fact, had been gradually realized, deranging, in its progress, all contracts for future payments, and, especially, trying the powers of endurance of persons who were living on fixed salaries.

We do not affirm that every article has been enhanced in price, as compared with former years. There are fluctuations which pro duce exceptions to any general rule; but, it is popularly said, and not without a solid foundation in truth, that money will not go much more than half as far now, as it did some ten years ago. The prices of food, rent, and fuel, and of many kinds of clothing are greatly enhanced, and servant's wages have gradually though slowly followed.

The great rise in the value of real proper ty in Canada, though chiefly attributable to the natural progress of the country, is, in part, accounted for by the rise in all other ommodities; inasmuch, as one who sells his farm for £1,000, when wheat is nine shilings a bushel, and other things in proportion, gets really little or no more for it, than if he had sold it for £500, when wheat was four hillings and six pence a bushel. And the same thing holds good with respect to salaties. The minister, or public servant, or clerk, who gets only the same nominal salary now that he got several years ago, has in reality had his salary reduced one third, or ne half, and his position and that of his amily must, in many cases, be distressing in e extreme. It appears evident, therefore, at the meritorious and hard-working clerks the various Government departments ould have a re adjustment of their salaries, erever that has not been already effected, that private employers should conscienusly consider this matter with a view to same end. It cannot be for the interest any one to have the clerks or other sernts in his employment reduced to pecuniary ficulties.
