



In one of these aff. irs yes erday three engineer officers were wound d, among whom was Carnegie, who was grazed by a bullet in the arm. We are, however, suffering a great deal more from cholera than from the enemy's fire .--In one regiment (the 61st Queen's) seven men died in one day from it.
