I came away, unedified and sad, ar feeling, I confess, as if most, or all, who ha gathered there, had come f om a mere son of duty, or from habit, or because they though if they did no come there would be no mee ing; and that but few could have been led the place by the true spirit of prayer, by a heartfelt need of God's blessing, and the fu assurance, that if rightly sought, he wou grant it.
