The rumor in question can therefore, if true, only refer to an illegitimate son of the King, a youth who is not more than ten or eleven years of age, and whom the mutineers have probably seized with the view of furthering their own purposes. The excesses of Nadir were to the Mogul sovereignty as a violent but passing attack of illness to an individual, which permanently weakens his constitution, indeed, but from which, though shaken, he yet recovers. The triumph of the English strikes the debiltiated patient dead. He who has borne the titles of Great Megul and King of Delhi lives still, it is true, but his sovereignty, His most inner and sacred apartments are the head quarters of the English army.
