DOMESTIC.

THE CASKET.—We were much disappointed in not getting the May number of the "Casket" ready for distribution this week, but several of the men in the Office have been ill, and it was impossible to supply their places. It may be expected with the next week's issue.

Mr. Thos. Hicks, of Dorchester, in a business note informs us that the religious meetings at that place are universally interesting. The Ministry of Elder Newcomb is blessed, and some are being converted. Some have recently joined the Redeemer in Baptism.

PAKES.—We see by the *Borderer* that the Mayor of St. John has constructed a new machine for packing hay. The constructor, a Mr. William King, in a letter to our *Seaville* temporary, says: "Herewith please accept a testimonial to show what may be done by applying proper machinery to our staple article. Hay density is about 10 lbs. to the cubic foot, but American presses give from 10 lbs. to 15, to the cubic foot, and over 10 and 15 to the cubic foot. The large press I made a year ago and the one I made last fall, give from 15 to 20 lbs. to the cubic foot, so that this machine will have at least one half the expense in freight, which is the great barrier in our way in getting hay to market with the article. This machine is equal in power to the English Hydraulic Press, and possesses the very great advantage that it can be constructed by a common mechanic from wood in our forests, with the assistance of a little iron work, which may be obtained in any smith's shop, and at an expense not over one half that the hydraulic presses cost, while working it is much more rapid and less expensive."

THE CAPITAL OF CANADA.—The English papers are discussing the question of the future capital of Canada, the Canadian Legislature having referred the question to the decision of a British government. The *London Times* has it that the weight of its advice is in favour of Quebec, because of the utter defencelessness of Toronto, Kingston, and Montreal, in the event of war with the neighbouring republic—a contingency remote, it is true, but still one which no Canadian can exclude from his calculations—of the impregnable defences, both of nature and art, which render the great citadel of Quebec the Gibraltar of North America.

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before he left the house; and that testified to by officer Davis was that, in the presence of Dr. Burdell, she told the officer that she would have the (Burdell's) heart blood. That, we believe, is all the evidence in reference to threats.

The only piece of evidence bearing on motive is that of one of the domestics, who she told that the Doctor was jealous of her (Mrs. Cunningham's) intimacy with Eckel.

The evidence in reference to her ascertainment of the hour at which Dr. Burdell and Mr. Ullman would respectively return on the night of the murder is furnished by the testimony of Mr. Ullman, of whom she made such an inquiry, and that of Mr. John H. Thompson, who had called at 31 Bond street in the afternoon of the fatal day, and who heard Mr. Cunningham say to the Doctor, as he was about to leave the house, "Harvey, what time will you be back?" or, "There is a good deal of testimony in reference to the disagreeable odor noticed in Bond street that night. Some portions of the testimony on that point are not so positively given as to what it seemed to proceed from, as other portions are. Dr. Burdell, whose evidence on this point is most adverse to the accused, acknowledged on his cross-examination that he had noticed a disagreeable odor in the street as early as nine o'clock that night, which odor he attributed to the burning of soap at a soap factory there.

These, we believe, are all the salient points that have been illustrated by the evidence so far, with the exception as to whether Mrs. Cunningham's agitation and excitement, when she heard of the murder, was theatrical and feigned, or was real. The principal witness on this point is Dr. Burdell, and he testified that her daughter Helen was lying on the bed in an unmistakable syncope or fainting fit, and that as Mrs. Cunningham did not offer to render her any assistance, it must have been because she was incapable of doing so.

The witness Farrell has not yet been examined.

By the *Europa*.
Barrington—Lord Elgin has left, per "Union," for Paris, on his way to China. Excepting Cabinet Councils, nothing of air in the political world. A numerous meeting of merchants and manufacturers was held in Manchester, for the formation of an association for the promotion of the growth of Cotton in British Colonies and other countries, by the diffusing of information, supply of machinery, and the removal to the utmost possible extent, of every legislative impediment.

A special meeting of European and American Steamship Company, the total cost of the eight steamships, recently purchased, was stated to be four hundred thousand pounds. Two hundred and twenty-seven thousand being already provided, it was resolved that the balance should be raised by the issue of twenty thousand £9 shares.

A great fire, at Liverpool, had destroyed, besides much other valuable property, two thousand five hundred bales of cotton, belonging to J. & D. Malcomson, by Moore & Co., B. J. Batcock & Co., and F. Lyons, Brothers.

The under-Secretary for Colonies has informed the Geographical Society, that the Government will ask the Parliament for a grant for the North Western American exploring expedition, which, in about a fortnight, would proceed to Lake Superior for a survey of the vast British possessions in that vicinity; and for an examination of the southern portion of the Rocky Mountains, with our territory. A possible further business of the expedition would be the discovery of a new passage to Vancouver's Island.

The expedition would be accompanied by Dr. Hector, as Geologist, Naturalist, and Surgeon, and Lieutenant Blackiston, to make magnetical observations. A Botanist would also accompany the expedition.

NEUCHÂTEL.—The Prussian and Swiss Plenipotentiaries have accepted the propositions of the mediating powers, subject to the approval of their respective Courts.

PARIS.—A proposition to substitute legal for Police supervision of Printer's Licenses, was carried in the Chamber by a majority of one, but rejected on the following day—Government in the meantime having collected its forces.

AUSTRIA.—Baron Bach is said to threaten to resign his plan of Commercial organization, for the whole empire, it having been returned to him, for revision, and reduction to a conformity with enactments in force previous to the invasion of Liberal ideas in 1848.

TURKEY.—The Commission for regulating the Russian Turkish frontier in Asia, as instituted by article 30 of Treaty of Paris, is to consist of two Turks, two Prussians, one Englishman, and one Frenchman, and will assemble at Kars on the 18th of this month.

MONTENEGRO.—Despatch from Paris announces that there is a fair prospect of the settlement of the differences between Austria and Montenegro. Prince Danilo has released a prisoner, and Austria has ordered the Montenegro refugees to be removed into the interior.

PERSIA.—Persian accounts of the recent battle of Bushire, state that the British advanced until they met the main body of the Persians, but they set fire to their (British) camp and equipment and retreated towards Bushire, where they were reinforced, and began the battle, which lasted four hours.

The Persian accounts adds that both parties were compelled to retire, by the torrents of rain which fell during the whole time, and at length rendered the ground utterly unfit for cavalry—that some of the Persian guns were left, but afterwards recovered, and that while the Persian loss was only 500, that of the British was 1,000.

VERY LATEST, BY TELEGRAPH TO LIVERPOOL.—The *Times* states that its news by the Overland Mail go to show that the Government and people of England have been quite right in their views of the Chinese affair, and have not been an hour too early in dispatching military and naval aid to our friends of China. The *Times* is of opinion that the diplomatic labors of Lord Elgin must be preceded by the strong argument of our military and naval chiefs. At present, there seems to be an end to all rational employment of mere missions.

OF THE RUSSIAN RAILWAYS, the city article of the *Daily News* says:—The share in the Russian Railways remains nominally quoted at a half to three quarters premium, but in reality there is scarcely a single transaction on them.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—By the latest intelligence, (to February 13th), robbery and violence were rife, and on the increase in British California.
