perienced Engineer. The report of the gentlemen who was employed will be presented at an early day, and I invite your attention to a subjet of such prominent interest to the whole eastern section of the Province.

Two acts have recently been passed by the Imperial Parliament for assimilating the Laws affecting Trade and Commerce in the United Kingdom, and Bills founded upon these, but adapted to our local Legislation, will be submitted to your approval.

Two measures have also been prepared, and will be immediately submitted to you, the one having for its object the more efficient protection of the Crown Lands, and the other, a more easy and economical process of Eschert. The subject of the Mines and Minerals, I ra-

gret to say, is still unsettled, the Home Govern-ment having been hitherto unable to come to a determination on this complicated and important question. 'The correspondence will shew that it has engaged the anxious solicitude of my government, and I entertain the hope that the great interests involved will be considered and disposed of in a manner acceptable to the

people. Since the close of last session, private enter-prise has completed a Telegraphic union of the North American Provinces by a Submarine Cable connecting Newtoundland with Cape Breton.

A still larger experiment is about to be made for carrying Telegraphic communication across the Atlantic. The Company by whom it was projected have entered into arrangements for conveying their messages across our territory, and the inhabitants of this Province, as well as the other parts of the American Continent, have a deep interest in their success. An intimation however has been conveyed to me that another Company, of adequate resources, proposes to lay down a Line from Ireland direct to Nova Scotia. Both parties will apply to you for legislative privileges, and I recommend their rn-spective claims to your attentive consideration. Be assured, gentlemen, that in this, as in

every other matter affecting the welfare and progress of the people whom you represent, you may rely on my cordial co-operation.

On the return of the members of the Assembly to their chamber, the Honorables Provincial Secretary, Solicitor General, the Hon. Mr. Howe, and Wm. Caldwell, Esq., were sworn in by the Clerk, and took their seats, when the Hon. Garroting in New York. The Examiner furpishes the following account of this horrid species of villany which appears to be exciting a good deal of alarm

n the citizens of New York at this time :--New Yorkers have had occasion, during the last month, to become somewhat familiar with garroting and garroters-terms which found their way into the London nomenclature of crime, some eighteen months or two years ago. Garroting seems to mean little else than modern highway robbery, for it is used in all sudden attacks in the street. The garroter is the city footpad of the ninteenth century. The name is, however, obviously derived from the process of throuling, in use in place of the gallows in Spain, and which has been imitated to a great extent here, as well as on the other side of the water, where, to quote from a letter of the Chaplain of the Pentonville Prison, published in the London Times of the 3 d ult : The garrotte robbers usually work in a gang, which consists generally of three persons. The tallest and most muscular comes behind the intended victim, and rapidly throwing his arms (which are usually fitted with a piece of wood near the elbow to facilitate the process) around the neck, presses the throat producing almost strangulation The others rifle the pockets and otherwise assist."

The subject is exciting a good deal of alarm in the community, and forms a prominent topic of discussion in private parlors, and through the organs of public opinion. A number of "Protection and Self Defence Clubs" hold weekly meetings, for the purpose of talking over and guarding against the stratagems of the ruffi ins who are prowling through the city; revolvers and other weap-ons are beginning to be carri d, almost as a matter of course, as was shown by the dis-charge of a barrel at the Academy of Music during the Opera the other evening ; and but a day or two since we chanced across a lad on Brondway, who was engaged in vending what he called the "Travete.'s Friend',—viz., a light gutta-percha cane, with a heavy leaden head. One of our leading journals, to be sure, so far from echoing, ridicules the general alarm, and calls those persons "old women" who are disturbed by the "cock and bull

Br. ship JoHN MILLAR, from Newry, Ireland, wrecked below Savannah, was discovered by schooner Catharine, morning 31st ult., on the shoal off Ossaban, and took off the captain and four of the crew with one of their boats, and left them off Tybee at 4 o'c.ock same day, from which point they started for Savannah to obtain assistance. Capt. Bell reports that he sailed from New-ry, Ireland, on the 13th Dec., 1856, met with a succes-sion of westerly winds and calms through the N. E. Trades. Made the land off Mosquito inlet on the 26th Dec., had light variable winds from that to the 29th, when the weather got very foggy—on the 30th, fresh breeze from N. E. thick fog, stood in and sighted shoals in 4 fathoms water, judged himself off the Gaskin shoal—stood to the westward with lead going for 1 hour to try and sight the tand—at 2 50 p. m. hauled off to the southward under easy sai.—at 4 p. m. wore ship and stood in N. W. At 6 p. m., wore ship in 5 fathoms; immediately after it fell calm, and he found the ship drifting in very fast, got the kedge out and brought up in 4 fathoms. At 8 p.m., a light breeze springing up from the westward, tripped the kedge, and stood off E. S. E. in 61 fathoms, when it again fell calm—brought her up with kedge in 5 fathoms. At 10, P.M., a strong breeze sprung up from S.S. E., and the ship started with her kedge, and, while in the act of hauling to the wind, the ship struck on the shoal off Ossabaw Bar, where she remained thumping heavily. At 7, A.M., the rudder broke off by the trunk, and the ship commenced making water very fast, put all hands on the pumps, but found the water gaining very fast, and at 11 A.M. it was over the ballast, and he therefore gave up all hope of saving the ship, and would try and save as much of the materials as possible, if the weather re-mained fine, is not he would have to abandon her. to be reported. LIGHTHOUSE CHANGES.—The Light House Board of Maine, are about making some changes in the Lights on the coasts, to which they call the attention of Ma-riners. In order to diminish the possibility of mistak-ing Moose Peak Light for Petit Menan Light, the in-terval between the flashes in the former light will, on the 1st of April, 1857, be changed from 2 minutes to 30 seconds; so that from and after that date the Moose Peak Light will be, as usual, a revolving light, but the interval between the flashes will be 30 seconds. On the same day, the time of revolution of the Manheigin Light will be altered from 2 minutes to 1 minute, and the red fash now shown will be thereafter discontinued; so that from and after Ap.il 1st, 1857, the time between the flashes will be 1 minute, and all the flashes will be of the natural colour.—Neus.
