IMPORTANT TO SHIPOWNERS. From the Edinburgh Daily Mail, April, 20.) A case of considerable importance to shipvners and others, interested in shipping, was ecided on Friday last, before the Justice of Peace Court here-James Craig, Esq., of Midleten, and James A. Campbell, Esq., Jr., of Stracathro, presiding. In September last the existing as to the propriety of the ship proceeding on the voyage, the master discharged most of the erew, paying them a full allowance for their set-rices, and, on doing so, gave up their advanced notes. One of the seamen, however, whose case came before the the Court on Friday, did not enter into the same arrangement as the others, but immediately went off on board of another ves-rel more which he was entered in the official el, upon which he was entered in the official og-book of the Brunelle as a deserter. The holder of this man's advance now brought an ac-hon against the owners of the Brunelle to compel hen to pay the amount sued for. To this de-mand the shipowners pled, 1st. That in terms of the note, the money was not payable till 10 days after the ship had finally sailed from Clyde, and the seamen then on hoerd earning wages. 2nd. That the individual referred to had deserted and theorem. That the individual referred to had deserted and thereby forfeited his wages, in conformity with the Merchants' Shipping Act. Mr. M'Ilvam, the twernment Shipping Agent at Greenock, gave twidence that the seaman had not been legally discharged before him; and the Court, after giving the subject full consideration, decided that the holder or indorses of the note had no claim against the owners of the Bourelle

holder or indorses of the note had no claim against the owners of the Brunelle. [This decision is in every respect a just one, the plain tenor of an advance note being that the amount therein stated is not due unless the sea-man not only remains on board, but while there does his duty and earns his wages. Any other judgement in this case would simply have been equivalent to holding out a strong inducement to seamen to abscond after receiving their advance notes; and with respect to the system of advan-cing money on these notes, it would be well if it could be altogether abolished, as in the great in-jority of cases it is a notorious fact that seamen do not receive half value for them, and it is gen-erally understood that shipowners would chear-fully pay a higher rate per month for the voyage on condition of no advance notes being required.]

England shall have a legation at Pekin, as Russia has. This legation is to consist at least of five members, and its chief personage is to have ment. 3rd, English military pos s are to be established in all the cities where English consult or consular agents reside. A piece of land shall be granted to the English at Canton, Shanghae, and Houg Kong, to erect forts and form military establishments there ; the strength of these garrisons is to be settled by mutual consent. In addition to these three principal conditions, there are some s condary points, left to the discretion to the English

ommissioner. Commissioner. The following letter from Sir. John Bow-ring appears in Mona's Herald, a paper published in the Isle of Man :----

Hong Kong, February 24, 1857.

My dear Sir,-I doubt not that it will be a gratification to my Manx friends to hear from the best authority that we are all recovered fom the effects of the poison, of which S: several hundred persons partook on the 15th January. About ten pounds of arsenic had been mixed with a batch of bread issued from the largest Chinese bakery in the colony, and the excess of the quantity led to immediate alarm—application of emetics and speedy ejection of " the perilous stuff." It left its effects for some days-in racking headaches, pains in the limbs, and bowels, &c. In my family, my wife, daughters, three guests, my private secretary, and myself, besides several servants, ate of the poisoned bread. Lady B.'s has been a bad case, as it is thought some of the arsenic had got into the lungs.— buil danger is over now. This mode of war-fare is hard to deal with, and will, I am sure-excite a general sympathy and indignation harge premiums have been offered by the Mandarians to any who shall set fire to our houses, kidnap or murder us, and many un-fortunate wretches of all nations (as the hatred of the Chinese is indiscriminating) have been seized, decapitated, and they hatre doff the public gaze.
