The appeal of the owner to the America can ship Carlyle, against the verdict of the Court of Admiralty for having caused the loss of the bark Grazia a Dio, by collision off Holyhead in July last, had been heard before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and the finding of the lower Court was reversed, judgment being pronounced in favor of the Carlyle.

A fire had occurred in Gilbert street, Lon don, entailing the loss of fifteen lives. The parties were asleep in the house at the time, and their escape was cut off by the rapid progress of the flames.

At the Liverpool Police Court, eighteen men of color, composing the crew of the ship Gertrude, were brought up, charged with mutinous and disobedient conduct during the voyage from New Orleans to Liverpool. Eight of the men were sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment.

At a recent meeting of the unemployed work people in Birmingham, they passed a memorial to the Queen, praying for an extensive system of free emigration. Their Chairman was requested to ask Mr. Bright to present the memorial, and to his communication he has received the following reply:

TRY.

London, March 26, 1858. " Dear Sir : When your memorial reaches me or Mr. Scholefield, we will at once take the usual course with respect to its presentation to the Queen.

" I am sorry to find that the 'unemployed' should be so numerous in Birmingham as to induce them to unite, with a view to some public measure for their relief. At this moment, the unfavorable condition of the markets of the United States, and of the continent of Europe, will account for much of the suffering which is being endured by the workingmen of England. I confess, however, that I can see no remedy for a large portion of the mischief complained of, so long as we find our taxes constantly on the increase, and our national expenditure augmenting.

"We are now spending twenty millions year more than we were spending only a few years back, and our military expenses have doubled since the year 1835, when the Duke of Wellington and Sir Robert Peel were in

"This year, I suppose, we shall raise in taxes at least £50,000,000 sterling more than will require to be raised by an equir population, living, not in England, but in the United States of America. Surely this wil account for much of the evils which you, and the memorialists, and the working classes ge nerally, suffer, and I am not surprised that sensible men should wish to quit a country where the burdens are so heavy and the po litical privileges of three-fourths of them ar so few. Every man who is not prepared to compel a better and more economical Government at home should emigrate, or the pauperism of his day will be deeper, and more without remedy, in the days of his children. I wish I was able to come to Bir mingham and talk to you about these grea questions. "Yours very respectfully. JOHN BRIGHT."
