SOMETHING NEW.—A vessel bound for St. Andrews lying at the Market Wharf on Saturday was taking in a cargo for Woodstock showing that the longest way round is in this case the shortest. The freight will be landed near the depot at St. Andrews, at 1s. a barrel and conveyed from there by rail and wagons to Woodstock for 20 cents more—altogether about 2s. 4d. a barrel. The usual freight by the St. John's River to Woodstock, has been well understood about 4s. a barrel.

THE RAILWAY.—We have great pleasure in announcing that the entire line of Railway is under contract between this City and Moncton, the arrangements having been concluded at the Commissioners' office yesterday. The whole work is let in sections of four miles each. The following persons are the Contractors:—Section 10 and 15 Brooks Beckwith and Foster, of Canada; 11 and 12, John Brookfield; 13, D. Myers; 14, William Stevens; and 15, W. H. G. Sumner, the whole to be completed in 2 years. It is worthy of notice that the expenses of these sections will be very considerably less than the original estimated cost.—Globe.
