### NINTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BIBLE UNION.

The New York Chronicle of the 9th inst. says: As we go to press (Wednesday), the first day's proceedings of the ninth anniversary of the American Bible Union are in progress at the First Baptist Church in Broome St. The attendance is good, and as there is nothing to disturb the harmony of the gathering, a pleasant session is anticipated. The Treasurer's report, which has just been presented, exhibits the total amount of receipts as \$35,376.26, including a balance from last year of \$241.13. The expenditures are within \$68.30, of this amount, the principal items being—

## Domestic.

THE GREAT INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.—A pamphlet which has been recently published in London, advocating the construction of a Great Intercolonial Railway from the Atlantic to the Pacific, says: the distance to China would be—From Liverpool to Halifax, 2466 miles; Halifax to Port William on Lake Superior, 1484 miles; Lake Superior to Fucus Straits, opposite Vancouver's Island, 1700; total 5650 miles. The distance from Fucus Straits to Shanghai, in China, is 3800 miles; total from Liverpool to Shanghai, 9450 miles.

The distance through the United States is 13,900 miles, viz., Liverpool to Panama 4,100, Panama to Shanghai, 9800. Difference in favor of Intercolonial route 2,350 miles.

From Panama to Japan, 8600 miles; Fucus Straits to do., 4,400. Panama to Canton, 10,000. Fucus Straits to do., 6,900. Panama to Singapore, 10,800; Fucus Straits to do., 8,200. Panama to Sandwich Islands, 4,700; Fucus Straits to do., 2,370; Panama to Sydney, 8,220; Fucus Straits to do., 7,230.

### AN APT REPLY.

The *Churchman* says that the "Founder of the Baptist sect" was expelled from the church as a heretic, hundreds of years ago. The *Religious Herald* replies: "We confess it. This event occurred A. THE RAILWAY.—We are informed that the stopping of the Cars at Gilbert's Lane, is only to be for a short time, until the road is cut down to a suitable level, and that the passenger station is to be near the East end of the Mill Pond. The road will be open again in a few weeks. —H. W. gets on the work from the nine mile house upwards? The 1st of November is at hand—and if not done by that time the public will expect the Government to take it into their own hands. Something must be done in earnest.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On last Friday evening, about 6 o'clock, Messrs. Robert Mawhinney and James Ellis of Mac's Bay, accompanied by a boy named Blades, were crossing Lepeux harbor, one of them attempted to hoist a sail, when the boat was struck by a heavy sea, and capsized. Two or three boats were immediately put out to their rescue, and Mr. Ellis and the boy were picked up and taken into a boat belonging to a ship in the harbor. Mr. Mawhinney was drowned before the boats could arrive. Great efforts had to be made to restore the boy to consciousness. Mawhinney's body has not been recovered. He is the third son of Robert Mawhinney, of Mac's Bay, and was 29 years of age.

NOVA SCOTIA.—In Halifax, Michael O'Mara has been fined 40s. and bound over in the sum of £300, to keep the peace, for assaulting and threatening to take the life of William Annand, Esq. M. P. P., for writing something about the late Archbishop Walsh in the Halifax Chronicle. Mr. Annand stated that he has been attacked frequently, and that his life has been in danger on several occasions. —Globe.

FIRE IN SPRINGFIELD.—The barn of Mr. William Cromwell, the head of the Bellie, was consumed by fire on Monday night last. All the hay, grain, &c., together with two horses, were consumed. The barn was large, measuring 96 feet in length. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

A halibut weighing two hundred and fifty pounds was caught at Machias, Me., 28th ult., after making a stout resistance.
