The News by the Atlantic.

There had been a great improvement in business affairs at Hambug.

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS .- In London on the 19th, the Funds were quite buoyant under the favourable returns of the binks, and money was easy at 82 per cent. for the best paper in the discount ma ket, and at 4 to 6 per cent. on Sock Exchange.

At Hamburg a further recovery of confidence was reported, and a rate of discount for the best paper receded to between 5 and

The suspension of Messrs. Schwarbe & Co. of Glasgow was announced; liabilities

On Monday the 21st, there was increased buoyancy on the London Stock Exchange, under the influence of the large arrival of specie from New York, and the news of the rapid recovery going on at Hamburg. Consols, railroad shares and o her securities, shared in the upward movement. On the Stock Exchange loans were obtained with ease at 4 to 5 per cent. At the Bank the demand continued light, and in the discount market the rate for best bills receded to 6

A deputation from the governments of Sweden and Norway had arrived in London, with a view of obtaining financial aid to the ex ent it was supposed, of £500,000, with which to prevent the permanent break up of some of the extensive establishments which have lately failed in those countries.

GREAT BRITIAN .- President Buchanan's Message attracted great attention in England. It was telegraphed entire from Livorpoel to some of the London Journals, being the longest dispatch ever sent by relegraph in England. The London Times, in its review of the Message confines itself to 2 opicsthe financial crisis and the Central American question. It construes Mr. Buchanan's iemarks on the former subject into a tribute to the monetary system of England, and recommends them to the attention of its roaders, that they may see how the currency, which has been so perfinaciously attacked ut home. is viewed by the most entightened men of ano her country.

"We have much p'easure in receiving the assurance of Mr Buchanan, that the interests of the two countries are identical and confined to securing a safe transit over all the routes across the Isthmus. Common sense must tell the Americans that in these questions we are strictly on the defensive, and the most inveterate declaimer against England cannot deny the concilia ory spirit in which she has treated them; but we can hardly be asked to give up the treaty of 1850, without a guaran ee that all i's important provis ons shall be re-enacted and the whole series af irritating disputes brought forever to an eud." him Indiagues
