The bones belonging to the head of an elephant, were discovered a few feet below the surface of the earth by some men who were digging on Baie de Verte Marsh, recently. When they found the skeleton head, tusks, a large animal of the *Ruminantia* class, good state of preservation, which is remarkable considering the centuries which have probably elapsed that they have remained in that position. They are now in the possession of A. Albert Gooten, at Baie de Verte, where they may be seen by those who take an interest in antiquarian research.

It is estimated that five tons of strawberries have been brought into the San Francisco market daily for three or four weeks. One garden in Oakland produces by itself over a ton easily. Some of these berries measure from five to six inches in circumference.

An heir to the throne of the Sandwich Islands was born on the 20th of May, and there was great rejoicing. The boy is to be called the Prince of Hawaii.

Fare from Boston to New York has been reduced to three dollars by the Sound route.

Another mathematical phenomenon has appeared on the 22nd of May, a native of Montreal, Ky. It is said that he can answer any mathematical question without a moment's delay. He declares that he is conscious of no mental effort but the answer is presented to his mind almost simultaneously with the question. Aside from this wonderful faculty he has a very ordinary and uncultivated mind.

The New York Tribune says that a warrant has been set on foot in that city having for purpose the colonization of the numerous bodies of spiritualists, socialists and free lovers on some of the islands in the South Pacific ocean. Meetings to promote this object have been held on several Sundays in a grove in New Jersey. A man named Tyler, formerly a Methodist clergyman, is at the head of the affair.

The Halifax Journal says:—The journey from Fredericton, N. B., to Halifax via St. John and Windsor, was recently accomplished in the short space of twenty-four hours. So much for Steamboat and Railway travelling.

They are building a Crystal Palace at Toronto for the Provincial Agricultural Fair. It is to be a splendid thing. The Municipal Contribution £5000 towards it.

There were said to be one thousand men at work upon the St. Andrew's Railroad. On the St. John and Shediac line there are about two thousand.—News.

THUNDER SHOWERS.—One of the most severe thunder showers that has occurred of late years was experienced in the vicinity last week on Thursday afternoon. The fluid must have struck in nearly a hundred places within ten miles of Boston. A woman was instantly killed in Cambridge, large numbers in various places were more or less injured, and great damage was done to buildings.

A ship captain arrived in town about ten days ago, put up at the Webster House, in love with a young lady for the first time in forty years, asked her hand, gave her four days to consider the matter, got an affirmative answer, was married, and is now on a wedding tour.

A Shark, some 14 feet in length, got entangled in a Salmonnet off Patridge Island on Tuesday night, and was captured by one of the Carleton fishermen.—News.

Three thousand five hundred children and five hundred adults recently sang at the Crystal Palace a variety of psalms, hymns, &c. The composed the "Topic Sol Fa Association."

In the British House of Lords the bill admitting Jews into Parliament, by modifying the vote passed to a second reading by a vote of 143 to 97.

In 1762 there were but fifty-six Baptist churches in North America, embracing about 5,000 members. In 1792, 891 churches with 65,000 members; in 1812, 2,000 churches; in 1832, over 5,000; in 1852, over 9,000; in 1856, over 11,000, and now probably over 12,000, with about one million members. The rate of increase has been greatest in Massachusetts and Virginia.

The total length of the five great lakes, according to the latest measurement, is 1,584 miles. They cover an area altogether of more than 90,000 square miles. The mean depth of Lake Superior is 985 feet; Michigan, 900; Huron, 800; Erie, 200; Ontario, 500.

In Australia the Methodist have 670 sanctuaries, and 633 other preaching stations. Communicants, upwards of 24,000; attendants on the divine worship, nearly 150,000. The number of children in the weekday and sabbath schools is 63,550.

France and 700 miles North of San Francisco, are drawing large numbers from California; and Minnesota and some other sections of the West are beginning to send out companies, though there is still great uncertainty about the whole matter.
