And now also the axe is laid unto the root of the tree every tree, therefore, which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. And the people asked Him, saying, What shall we do then? He answereth, and said unto them, He that hath two coats, let him impart to him that hath none;" many persons will repent in Adam. but will not come and divide their loaf with the poor; "he that hath meat, let him do likewise;" many persons repent in general, but would never think of sending a barrel of flour to a starving family. "Then came also the publicans to be paptized, and said unto him, Master what shall we do?" The publicans were the tax-gatherers, and what did John say to them? Repent in general? "And he said unto them, Exact no more than that which is appointed." He did not tell them in vague terms that they were sinners, and must repent, but he struck the axe at the very root of the tree. "And the soldiers likewise demanded of him, saying, And what shall we do?" What did he say unto them? Not that they must go into mourning for their wickedness, but he came right to the point, "and said unto them. Do violence to man," as they were in the habit of doing: "neither accuse any falsely," as they were also in the habit of doing; "and be content with your wages," as is very likely they never were.
