THE NEW YORK MARKETS .- Finance and Trade .- Abundance of money and accumulanon of capital at the centers of commerce. seem to be the prominent characterisic of financial affiirs. The manufacturing in-terest is nor yet fully employed-the shipping interest is inactive, and there is yet but little spirit evinced in employing capital for commercial enterprises-the consequence is, large sums of money are waiting for investment. Stocks, the first to feel a pressure or an abundance, have advanced greatly in value. Some little speculation was manifisi ted a week or two since in articles of merchindise, but within the past few days it has somewhat subsided. The demand for goods from the country is still moderate. This is a little speculation that is occasionally exhibited. The receipt of California gold continues very regular. The last four arrivals have averaged over \$1,500,000 each, which is an increase of nearly thir; y per cent. over the corresponding receipts last year, and as there is but little export demand, will increase the specie reserve of our Banks.

The Government is still a borrower, the reduced imports lessening the receipts to such an extent that its expenses can only be met by a continued issue of Treasury Notes. which are selling from 1 to 1 per cent. dis-count. The loan of \$6,000,000 for the 15th inst. is expected to be taken at very low rates.

#### CAPTURE OF THE TREASURY.

For six days the Western gate had been open, and exit had been denied to neither men, nor treasure, surely there could be nothing left to reward the captors. It consists of sheaves, around which the cable is passed ; these sheaves are fixed upon a carriage which moves back and forward on a frame, as on a railroad; and this frame varies its inclination with the surging of the vessel, and this is combined with the working of various counter weights and springs, so that the strain upon the cable and the rapidity with which it is paid out will be equalized, whatever the speed or the position of the ship.

RAILROADD.-There were in operation in the United States on the 1st January, 1858, (according to the Railroad Journal) 26,210 miles of railway, which cost nearly one thousand millions of dollars. There are about 500 roads and branches. In 1848, there were 5,265 miles in operation, an increase of 20,945, an average addition of more than 2,000 miles a year.
