

INTERRUPTION OF MAIL COMMUNICATION.

For the last fortnight the usual mails to Windsor and Digby have not been carried by the steamers, as usual, and the consequence is, that disappointment and annoyance have been felt on all hands. The idea of sending letters and papers to the Central and Western sections of Nova Scotia all way round by land when there are two boats to Windsor and two to Digby, every week, seems too absurd to meet with any thing short of the most decided disapproval. We know not who is to blame; but we fear there is blundering going on in the chief Post Office somewhere. Such mismanagement is felt by tens of thousands to be a serious evil, and one for which the Post Master General must be held accountable.

Our Nova Scotia friends will see by this the cause why they have received the *Visitor* so irregular for the last few weeks. We hope now that arrangements are in progress which will prevent a like occurrence for many a long day.

"Omnibus quae prosunt sequimur," or "we labor for the good of all," is the inscription on one of the chimneys of the city of Lowell. THE CONVERSION OF SAILORS.
We rejoice to hear once more from Bro. Stockbridge. We were much interested in his short visit to our city to which he refers, and its efforts to much pleasure to learn by the following communication from his pen that God is fulfilling his gracious promise in the conversion of the "abundance of the sea" to himself.

MR. EDITOR:—Six years ago a few of the christian people of St. John contributed money to aid the Mariner's Church, at 234 Cherry-st., New York, and I am sure they will be glad to hear how God has prospered that interest.

Revival influences were felt in the latter part of last year, and some of the earliest conversions of the present great awakening occurred in this Sailor's Chapel. Since the advent of the new year about 175 persons have been added to the church by Baptism, nearly half of them being sailors; and it is believed that in the last six months as many as a hundred sailors have been specially benefited by their attendance at that Chapel. It is known that some of them have gone to sea, rejoicing in hope, who have not had an opportunity to make a profession of religion. Among the sailor members of this church are the representatives of over twenty nations and people.

A few evenings since it was my pleasure to see two of the crew of the American man-of-war to which I had been baptized and added to the

Mariner's Church. I may here add that for three months, the sailors on board my ship have carried on a prayer meeting every evening among themselves. They originated it and have maintained it. God is in all this, encouraging us to look and labor for the conversion of the abundance of the seas.

If any of your readers happen in New York, they will find the chapel 234 Cherry street, open every night, and may chance to hear some of these sailors telling how God has blessed their efforts in the conversion of their shipmates; for all the sailors of this church are sent forth as lay-missionaries.

GOLD AT FREDERICTON.

A report announcing the discovery of gold on the banks of the river above Fredericton, was going the round of the papers last week. It was stated that small particles of pure gold had been washed from the sand, and that little nuggets from one to ten grains each had been discovered. Many doubted, but others were sanguine and hastened off to the new diggings, expecting soon to realize a fortune, but the bubble has exploded, and the following Telegram published in the Monday's Leader exposes the deception.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 9.

Gold discoveries said to be a hoax, perpetrated by some half dozen young men (or rather scoundrels) by melting gold with other metal and distributing it through the sand, knowing themselves where to pick it up, and thus deceiving hundreds of persons. The fraud was only discovered this morning.
