BAZAAR AT THE SURREY MUSIC-HALL FOR MR. SPURGEON'S PROPOSED NEW CHAPEL .--Mr. Spurgeon's congregation are still inde-fatigably pursuing their determination to build their emment minister a new chapel that shall be somewhat equal to the requirement of his popularity.

Five thousand two hundred pounds have been already realised for this laudable purpose, and in aid of this fund, a bazaar to last for four days, was inaugurated on Tuesday, at the Music Hall, Surrey Gardens, under the patronage of the Duchess of Sutherland. This magnificent and beautiful hall was tastefully decorated for the occasion, with flowers and evergreens, and also with the flags and bau-ners of England, France, Sardinia, America, Turkey, Prussia, and Russia. Around the hall we observed the following appropriate mottoes, " Jehovah Jirch" (The Lord will motices, "Jenovan Jirch" (The Lord will provide), "Let us Build," "O Lord, our G.d, of Thine own have we given Thee," "Giory to God in the highest, &c.," "Ex-celsior," "The Earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof," "Love," "Carpe diem," " The Lord loveth a cheerful giver," & . The stalls (fifty seven in number) were arranged with great taste, and so conveniently disposed as to allow an easy passage to the visitors, and adequate room for inspecting the multifarious auractions of the place. The spacious platform at one end of the hall was entirely occupied by the various collections of Mrs. Spurgeon which were most numerous. Here were presents from Christian friends in Constantinople, the Crimea, America, Australia, and Russia. Gen. Sir John Burgoyne, who evine d deep interest in the success o the undertaking, procured several of these

specimens of foreign taste and industry. Mrs. Spurgeon's stalls-for she has several -contain many objects of interest. The ex-hibition is mainly the work of ladics, and therefor : one must not be surprised at the quantity of baby linen, dolls, miniature crad'es, articles for the toilet, embroidered slippers, covers for chairs and music-stools, lace, and the thousand and one articles, in the production of which women of taste occupy their leisure hours ; but there is scarcely any stall which does not manifest skill, taste, and design on the part of the fair exhibitor.

Behind the organ in the gallery there is a choice collection in glass of Bohemian and Bavarian vases, lustres, jewet-stunds, ink-stands, toilettes, &c.; and as you descend the south-eastern staircase you will find por-traits of Mr. Spurgeon and Lord Palmerston : and, lest you should be unable to guess who they are, a bill informs you they are the "two Prime Ministers of England." THL STORMING OF PEEPLIA BY MAJOR ORB. -Major Orr, by a rapid movement access the river at Ilindia, brought his troops up to Mehidpore, surprised the enemy's cavalry in the neighbourhood of that town, and effected his junction with the Mhow brigade. The road from Ilindia runs in a nor h westerly direction over the hill's of the Vindhya chain to Peeplia, a town and fort, owned and held by Dowlut Sing, for whose head the supreme government offer a thousand rupees. Peeplia was consequen by Orr's first destination. He march ed the first day (date not given) twenty miles, to PaneelBeywar, where he learnt that Dowlut Sing eccupied the fort with three or four hundred followers. This intelligence induced him to s'art from camp at night [25th Oct.] and try with his cavalry to surround the place Leaving the infantry to follow leisurely, he started at midnight on the road to Peeplia. The rajah, however, had been made aware of his approach, and resolved on his side to sur-prise Orr's column. The two forces crossed each o her by different roads in the night, Polut Sing making for a pass through which he knew Orr's men must march, Orr hastening on to surprise the fort and leaving Capt. Abbott to watch the passes and warn the infantry. Peeplin was surrounded a little after daybreak by the brigadier with the 4 h Ni zam's cavalry on one side, and Capi, M array on the other, the latter entering the village, which he occupied without resistance. The men in the fort kept up a heavy fire from their matchlocks, without doing much injury. All necessary arrengements having been made a summons to surrender was issued, which the rebels treated with disdain, and preparations were made to storm: At two o'clock in the afternoon the remainder of the infantry, cav alry, and artillery joined the advanced party and a cunnonade for hwith commenced. Af ter two hours of continued firing, the enemy showing no signs of surrender, the infantry moved up to storm, Mujor Orr, Capt. Sinclair, and Lieut. Samuel leading the assault, and in a few minutes they entered the place, killing fifteen men, wounding several others, and taking the 105 prisoners. Major Orr remained a short time at Peeplia, and marched on the 29th to Rajooghur, where a fort was found,
