

fire he rushed on deck without his cap, and when he saw the flames, exclaimed, "We are all lost!" He tried to get out the boat, which when let down was swamped, and he, whether accidentally or not I do not know, fell into the sea and was soon left behind. The fourth officer was in this boat; he cut her loose from davits—she was carried under screw and smashed; several in her were drowned, three or four men escaped on fragments, and were picked up by Maurice, as before stated. About same time one metallic life-boat was let down from port-bow and swamped, but got cleared away with about thirty-three persons in her, including first and third officers and several women. Men in this boat capsized her two or three times trying to clear her of water; ten persons were thus drowned including some women; they afterwards bailed her out with life-provers out in two, and pulled to the Maurice, having picked up two or three passengers before reaching the bark. Altogether there were sixty-seven souls taken into the Maurice. During the night the Norwegian bark came up with steamer, and next morning a boat was observed going round the burning ship; they may have picked up a few persons, but only a very few. The Maurice had no communication with Norwegian. About 7 o'clock the Maurice sailed for Fayal to deposit the rescued passengers. About two o'clock same afternoon fell in with bark Lotus, Captain Treffy, of Yarmouth, N. S., from Liverpool for Halifax. As I was anxious to get on British territory, Captain Treffy kindly gave me passage. He was also anxious to take all American citizens, but there was such a rush of foreigners into the boat that only one load of eleven could be got off; even several of these were foreigners. The fire is known to have arisen from very culpable negligence of some of crew. The captain and surgeon considered it expedient to fumigate the steamer with burning tar; the operation was to be performed by boatswain under superintendence of fourth officer; the boatswain heated end of chain to dip into the tar to produce a smoke; the end became too hot to hold, and he let it drop upon deck to which it set fire the tar upset, and immediately all about was in flames. A feeble attempt was made to extinguish flames, but without effect; there was nothing at hand to meet such an emergency. The rescued passengers saved nothing but the clothes on their backs, and even part of these were torn off and otherwise lost. Six hundred souls supposed on board—many women and children. Mr. Brew is the only British subject saved. He is in British civil service, on way to British Columbia; will proceed to Boston per steamer Eastern State on Tuesday, en route for New York.

Theodore G. Glaubekler's statement:—About a quarter past 2 p. m., Sept. 13th, being in state room, heard cry of "Fire." Hastening on deck, saw flames breaking through middle deck, and captain trying to get people out second boat port side to have it lowered. Hastened to starboard deck to keep people from boat. After a few minutes, turned around to go to quarter deck but could not get through fire; remainder on forecastle. Ship all this time going onward against wind. With assistance of sailors out down jib-sails to throw into water to use in checking progress of fire, but people on deck did not understand our intention. Merely threw them into water; tried to discover something to save passengers, but nothing was to be found. Spars had been thrown overboard, buckets being near pipe were all on fire. In about half an hour forecastle fell, shortly after mainmast; about same time engine appeared to stop. Ship thus far had been heading west, gradually turned north, finally north-east; soon after boiler seemed to collapse. In ten minutes magazine exploded. By turning of ship, flame and smoke drove to forecastle. Suffering then became intense. Our only hope now being two vessels in distance, one of which afterwards proved to be "Maurice" approached us slowly; the other further off steering west took no notice of us, although she was signalled to do so by Captain of "Maurice." Having taken my stand on chain-stairboard side, gradually advanced forward to make room for others. About five o'clock "Maurice" sent off boat and soon as it came near I jumped into the water and soon reached it, seven others were taken in and the boat returned to the bark. Two boats belonging to the bark continued to ply to and from steamer, picking up all they could, until darkness made it impossible to find more sufferers. Soon after sunset, first officer and about a dozen others came to the bark having saved themselves by life boat. Later some Swedish sailors came in part of a boat, Mr. Brew and a German in part of another boat. Glaubekler's account of origin of fire coincides with that of Brew in every particular. When Captain Waters of "Prince Albert" ascertained that twelve Austrian sufferers had arrived, he kindly offered all free passage, and detained steamer for the purpose allowing them to embark. Ten thus saved themselves by generosity, and sailed for New York at five, Sunday p. m.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRINCE ALBERT.
[By Telegraph to the News Room.]
The Prince Albert, Capt. Waters, from Galway midnight 14th, off Halifax Harbor 10 Saturday night, reached dock at 9 1/2 Sunday morning, reports met succession heavy gales first few days. 17th, broke two masts; screw proceeded under canvas remainder voyage. 22d encountered terrific hurricane; sustained no damage except loss of sails of life-boat; 14th passed Bremen ship Johannes bound east; 19th, passed steamer with two masts and two funnels bound east.
British Government just renewed contract with ditto Steam Navigation Company of Liverpool period of six years for conveyance of semi-monthly mails along west coast South America from Panama to Valparaiso.
Literary Gazette says there is well grounded hope that Canada will next summer be visited by some prominent member of Royal family if not by Queen and Prince Consort.
Barbary—Shipment of the short end of the Atlantic Telegraph Cable in progress on board steamer Biblos at Plymouth. As cumbersome nature of Cable necessitated caution in work of stowing, it was not expected to be all on board before night of 16th when "Biblos" would proceed to Thames. Shores steadily maintained at 500.
FRANCE.—Political news unimportant. Lyons silk market continued to improve, and prices had further advanced. This favorable movement is in a great measure ascribed to arrival of orders for American spring trade on the scale than had been hoped. Two large cotton mills near Rouen, one occupied by M. Piel, the other by M. Fleury, had been destroyed by fire with valuable contents.
ITALY.—Neapolitan Government had received notice that a quantity of fulminating grenades, in form of fruit, had been sent to Malta, whence they were to be introduced into Neapolitan States.
SPAIN.—Reports of discovery of new republican conspiracy at Malaga were current.
The bank of Valadolid had raised its rate of discount to eight per cent.
Queen and royal family had reached Corunna, and were received with great enthusiasm.

ACADIA COLLEGE.—A letter from Dr. Cramp, says:—Brother Higgins declined our invitation, and we have found it necessary to employ two of our young men as Tutors—Messrs. H. Vaughan and Weatherbe.
We were working out the resolutions passed by the convention, as substitutes for Brother Spurgeon's and the amendments therein and trust to be sustained by the Denomination. College has re-opened with twenty-one students.

A HOUSEHOLD BAPTIZED.
A note from Rev. James Bleakney informs us that during his short stay at Cape Tormantine, the Lord's work greatly prospered; that 20 persons were baptized by him upon a profession of their faith, and amongst them was an entire household consisting of seven persons.—This is the second household which this missionary has baptized in his day. But he never baptized an unconscious infant in his life.
