

Two gentlemen recently met and conversed together in the cars from Portland to Boston, and finding that they were going to the same place, they ascertained that they were going to the same house. These coincidences puzzled them; but they were surprised and delighted when they found they were brothers, who had not met for twenty-four years, one having been in the country nineteen years, another in the service of the Pasha of Egypt twenty years, and the other having been sixteen years in East India.

Latest from Europe and the East

British Troops in entire Possession of Lucknow, &c., &c.

In the House of Commons on the 23d ult. the Government indicated the policy it proposes to pursue with regard to India. Instructions have been sent to Lord Canning recommending the fullest toleration and mercy consistent with judgment. It was not intended to proceed with the India Bill No. 2, but to found a bill upon the resolutions respecting India now before the House. Some discussion took place on the subject of the Militia and the National Defence.

It is calculated by the Chancellor of the Exchequer that the expenditure of the financial year will amount to sixteen millions. The European Times says: "It is some satisfaction to know that this deficiency is not caused by any diminution in the permanent prosperity of the nation, but by old engagements and the cessation of taxation. In fact, the state of the revenue during the past year, notwithstanding the commercial crisis, has been highly satisfactory, and shows a condition of things more encouraging in the aggregate than might have been anticipated."

There was an improvement in the Paris Bourse on the 22d ult., the three per cent. rents having closed at 69.30, being an advance of 1.4 per cent.

The Dublin Evening Mail gives currency to a rumor that the Prince of Wales will be made Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

The *James Daines*, one of the Black Ball line of clipper ships, belonging to Messrs. James Baines & Co., was almost wholly destroyed by fire in one of the Liverpool docks, on the 32d April.

The Emperor of the French has completed his 50th year, having been born at the Tuileries on the 20th April, 1808.

The members of the United Service Club gave the Duke of Malakoff a dinner on a magnificent scale, at their palatial quarters in Pall Mall, on the 22d April, at which the Duke of Cambridge presided. A large number of Cyprian officers, of both services, were present.

The process of stowing the Atlantic Telegraph cable on board the *Niagara* and *Agamemnon* is proceeding with all possible expedition in the tidal basin at Keyham.

Trade was very much depressed in France, and large numbers of workmen had been discharged from many of the manufactories. A new and stringent law upon the press has been passed in the Greek Chambers.

The intrepid Captain Peel, R. N., was severely wounded in recent operations in India.

Lieut. W. S. R. Hodson, who had distinguished himself in the war in India, was killed before Lucknow on the 11th April.

The restrictions upon the exportation of corn from all parts of the Regency of Tunis are repealed.

The liberation of serfs by the nobles is still proceeding in Russia.

A large fire had occurred at Christiania, in Norway, destroying property to the value of £110,000.

The *Araby*.—Thirty-eight ensigns are gazetted without purchase.

The *Leviathan*.—It appears that a further outlay of £172,000 is required to complete the *Leviathan*, making the total cost of the ship £204,522, or at the rate of £34 per ton builders' measurement. In order to raise the additional amount required and to pay off the present liabilities of the company—£211,282 11s. 10d. in all—it is proposed to issue debentures and preference shares. The vessel will not be completed before autumn, when it is intended to make several preliminary voyages to America for the spring to commence her voyages to India or Australia.

The *Suez Canal*.—The Viceroy of Egypt having taken considerable interest in the Suez Canal project, the Porte has required that he should abstain from any display of zeal regarding the scheme.

FRANCE.

The Emperor has resolved upon inviting Queen Victoria to the great festivities which are projected for the middle of July in the port of Cherbourg. Lord Cowley will come to London to settle with the Court of St. James' the details of this interview, which is intended to partake somewhat of a demonstrative character.

It is stated that the French riflemen are to be armed with double-barrelled guns, and that the experiment will be made with a few companies at first.

SPAIN.

Madrid, April 21.—The Government has been questioned on the subject of the intention attributed to President Buchanan to make war against Spain, and declared that the report was unfounded.

A Spanish squadron has been fitted out at Cadiz to convey troops and stores for the new settlement projected by the Spanish Government on the island of Fernando Po, in the Gulf of Biafra, with a view to the protection of Spanish commerce on the Guinea coast.

SARDINIA.

Turin April 23.—The date in the Chamber of Deputies on the new Press and Jury Bill closed this day. The measure has been adopted in principle by 129 votes against 29.

April 22.—The answer of the Neapolitan Government to the last Sardinian note about the Cagliari has been officially communicated to-day to Count Cavour. The Neapolitan Government gives a flat refusal to consent to the Sardinian claims.

CHINA.

Canton continues quiet.

NAPLES.

Accounts from Naples, in the Universe, state that serious preparations are being made for defending the territory against Sardinia. The trial of the Cagliari prisoners is continued.

RUSSIA.

A dispatch from St. Petersburg announces that on and after the 30th of May foreign ships will be admitted to the ports of Pori, Anapa, Sukum Kali, and Redut Kale, on the Black Sea.

LATER FROM LUCKNOW.

(From the Bombay Times.)

Our information is derived exclusively from the telegraphic despatches daily received by the government from Allahabad and the seat of war, and is so succinct that we place them at once before our readers in their original shape.

FROM ALLAHABAD, MARCH 15.

By the Governor-General's order, the following telegraphs just received by the Commander-in-Chief, Headquarters, dated Martine, 15th March, is forwarded for information. It was reported in the afternoon of yesterday, after the fall of Kaiserbagh, that the enemy were streaming out of the city in vast numbers in the direction of Sandal Camp. Up to the present moment there are rebels in the city, but we have no reliable information. Brigadier Campbell, who was well placed on the left of the Alumbagh position, started in pursuit, at two this morning, with a very strong brigade of cavalry, and two troops of horse artillery. Brigadier General Sir Hope Grant advanced towards Sandal Camp, with a view of intercepting fugitives who may be turned off by Brigadier Campbell's movements. He has with him one thousand sabres and two troops of horse artillery. He will be followed tomorrow by an infantry brigade and a heavy battery. He is directed to halt at Sandal Camp for instructions. This is a direct road to Rohilund. Her Majesty's 75th regiment has been ordered to leave Cawnpore tomorrow, en route for Meerut.

FROM ALLAHABAD, MARCH 18.

The following message of this date has just been received from the Commander-in-Chief:—We are in possession of the greater part of the city. Jung Bahadur has done good service in taking the line of works from which Alumbagh was long threatened, seven guns falling into his hands on his advance on the right yesterday. The first attempts at restoration of authority in the city are being made, but until all resistance is put down but little progress can be expected. The inhabitants have fled from the city, and are in the neighboring villages. Everything will be done to reassure them. I expect the Moosabagh, the last post held by the enemy to fall tomorrow morning, an attack having been organized.

FROM LUCKNOW, MARCH 19.

The last post held by the enemy fell this day, and the cavalry had a most successful pursuit, capturing guns. Miss Jackson and Mrs Orr have been saved. The city is now completely in our possession. We have already collected 117 guns. The enemy is in flight towards the north west.

FROM ALLAHABAD, MARCH 20.

The Moosabagh having been taken this morning, there is no longer no enemy in Lucknow. Mrs Orr and Miss Jackson arrived to day in the Maharajah Jung Bahadur's camp, having been rescued by Capt. Marshall and Lieut. Boole, of the artillery, with a small party of Ghazaks. They were protected by Meer Vazeer, Ally Darogah, and had been well treated by him; the same intelligence has been reported by the Commander in Chief, Cavalry had gone in pursuit to northwards, and arrangements were being made for the withdrawal of part of the troops from the troops from the city. The Commander in Chief was engaged in deciding on details of the future garrison, and the selection of a proper military position.

LATEST

BY RITISH AND IRISH MAGNETIC TELEGRAPH.

CORFU, April 23, 1 p.m.

ALEXANDRIA, April 23.—The Calcutta and China mails, per Hindostan, leave this afternoon, with intelligence from Calcutta to the 23rd of March, Madras, 20th, Ceylon 2nd April, and Hong Kong 15th March.

The *Benituck*, with extra mails and passengers, from Calcutta, arrived at Suva on the 14th. There is intelligence from Lucknow to the 22d March. On the 20th Brigadier Campbell's force returned from the pursuit of the enemy. Hutchinson, of the Lancers, was dangerously wounded, and Cooper, of the Rifles, dead. On the 21st the Nombre's (Nana's) retreat was stormed. He escaped, and a reward of fifty thousand rupees is offered for his head.

Outram's force had discovered and destroyed rebels in Lucknow; and the Prime Minister is among those reported as killed.

Cape, of the 13th Native Infantry, and Thacker were murdered by the enemy. Fanatics still fire on our troops.

The Governor-General's proclamation, calling on the Zemindars to submit, had produced no effect.

Oude is pacified; the enemy flying towards Secundra. Jung Bahadur goes to Allahabad. No civil officers had yet been sent to Lucknow by the Government. Some inhabitants were returning to the city. The heat was increasing daily. A telegraph from Allahabad, of the 24th, states that Sir Hope Grant was sent on the 23d to disperse a body of insurgents under Rajah Jai Singh, at Kuree, and returned perfectly successful. He took twelve guns.

The disarming act was being enforced in the Northwest provinces.

The sentence of the King of Delhi had not yet been made public.

In the Calcutta import market British piece goods and mule twist had improved, but business in general was limited. The produce market was dull. Government securities had improved, four are quoted 18 discount. Exchange on London 2s 1d to 2s 1d for documents.

The Madras import market was pretty active. Money rather less active. Exchange documents 2s 1d.

Canton continues quiet.

At Hong Kong business in imports was active.
