

LETTER FROM MR. SPURGEON.

The American publishers of Mr. Spurgeon's books have recently received a letter from him, in which he says: "Accept my thanks for the good news which you have sent me, but I really cannot be so vain as to imagine that my sermons could have more than an infinitesimal influence upon your revival. O how I bow beneath the weight of my Master's goodness, and the very fact that even in your most distant settlements, I am preaching, is more than I can realize."

"We have, every since my ministry began, received the influence of the Holy Spirit very largely, and it seems to me, that in the midst of my congregation we have unconsciously enjoyed, for four years, the very mercies which we have wondered at in you. In June I received forty-eight into fellowship, all of whom I have baptised; and this is our regular mode of proceeding. In my chapel, I have more members than seats, and were it not for the Music Hall, I should have little hope of converting sinners, for there are none to be converted, if all who profess to be Christ's are really so."—N. A LIVE MAN WITH HIS BRAINS SHOT OUT.

A man named Brown, belonging in Memphis, Tenn., attempted to commit suicide at Lagrange, Mo., a few days since, by shooting himself through the head. The ball passed through the skull, between the eyes, and lodged in the back part of the head. Part of the brain was scattered over the front of his hat. Medical aid was quickly at hand, and, strange to say, after a period of insensibility, the man revived, and is now able to sit up and converse intelligently, and is considered in a fair way of recovery.
