ENGLAND. The British Government have formally pro claimed strict neutrality, and warned its subjects against violations.

The War Department has issued an importeer corps throughout England. The activity in the English dock yards is equal to the height of the Crimean war.

The Parliamantary elections were nearly all over. The result was as last reported. Mr. Joseph Sturge of Birmingham, died auddenly this morning.

LATEST. From the London Daily News of the 14th of May: We have been favored by a commercial house with the following extracts from their Italian correspondence, which will be found interesting at the present moment:

"VENICE, May 3. - A French squadron is in the Adriatic, but we know not with what in-" ANCONA, April 30 .- We are indeed unfor-

tunate. The military preparations of Austria are on a scale to terrify any one. It looks as if we were to be transformed into a second Malakoff. Unwards of 5000 tons of cannon, combustibles, and other materials have already been landed here. The garrison of 2500 men, and now of 7000, is preparing quarters for additional and imminent reinforcements. It does not appear to be a question of holding Anonca only, but it looks as if something more serious was meditated. The requisitions of the military commandant are terrible, and extend to all the neighboring towns. Our authorities have ceased to occupy themselves with the interests of the place, and the Communes are ignored. Our magistrates will pro-bably be dismissed to-day, and we left to the mercy of the Austrian troops. We are all firmly of opinion that our government is in secret accord with that of Vienna. Every one is leaving

The Independance Belfe states that the agitation in the Romagna is increasing. The native troops, and even the Gend 'armerie, and the Swiss, are disposed, it is said, to take part in the movement as soon as the signal shall be given. At Rome one would certainly have broken out before this, if Gen. De Guyon had not opposed any movement. The Austrians not only occupy and Ancona, but Ferli Ravenna, Rimini, and have just sent reinforcements to

Letters from Modena state that Duke Francis V., having demanded reinforcements from Bologna, an Austrian regiment was sent from that place. The Duke went to meet it, but on his return to Modena, escorted by a guard of nobles, a collision occurred between the troops and the populace. Several arrests were made. On the English coast for several days two French steamships of war have been lying to

outside of Plymouth, and it is reported that two others are outside of Falmouth. On Wednesday a corvette wi habout 18 guns, with painted ports, and a schooner of 12 guns, all black, were observed for five hours, four miles S. S. E. of the Eddystone, in the run of the homeward bound ships. The schooner, when heiled by a pilot boat, declared her nation, but declined answering any other questions. A despatch from Messina gives an account of

an affray between a regiment of Swiss and a body of 96 volunteers, about to embark for Piedmont in a Genoese brig. The latter gave way to some patriotic cries, whereupon the Swiss charged them, killing 9; 12 of the Swiss were killed. 400 arrests have taken place at Palermo.

The London Times, in its city article on the 14th, remarks upon the possible effects of the war upon the commerce of England, in the even of that power being involved in hostilities, and points out that, although the statute law of the United States precludes altogether the possibi hty of registering European ships under the A nerican flag, it will be quite practicable to place such vessels under that flag by a bill of sale, drawn up by the American Consul, with a ertificate that she is owned by an American citi zen. She will then get the protection afforded by the U. S. Government, remaining with regard to tonnage dues and all similar conditions under the liabilities common to any foreign vessel .-Should England become involved in war, it is probable that increased latitude might be given by special acts to facilitate the granting even of a national register.

Arrangements had been made in London for holding a public meeting (to be presided over by the Lord Mayor) to memorialize the government in favor of the non-intervention of England in the continental struggle. M. Kossu'h was expeoted to address the meeting, and speak in support of the course pursued.

A war supplement to the official London Gazette of May 13. contains a royal preclamation, which declares Her Majesty at peace with all Sover-eigns, Powers and States, and firmly determined to abstain altogether from taking any part directly or indirectly in the war between Austia and Sardinia and France ; and Her Majesty's subjects are commanded to observe a strict neutrality. The proclamation then proceeds to point out the various acts in violation of neutrality which are to be guarded against.

The London Star argues that England, by declarating her neutrality in a struggle, the only avowed object of which is a violation of treaties, confesses that the treaties of Vionna are not worth fighting about, and gives them up altoge-
